The final service of the Week of Prayer took place at the Salvation Army Citadel Saturday night. Adjutant Miller of the Salvation Army was the chairman and Rev. G. M. Young, pastor of the Methodist church, was the speaker of the evening. His subject was "The School and the Home."

Again Below Zero.
The weather which was mild for a short time again has turned colder. The lowest temperature recorded last night at meteorological observatory was five degrees below zero. Saturday morning the official temperature was thirteen degrees below the cipher.

Settled Old Account.
Mr. William Cruikshank, Receiver General of the province, has returned from Kent county where he secured a settlement of a long standing account of the province against the municipality in connection with the Provincial Hospital. He states that smallpox has obtained a strong foothold in Kent, forty cases being the estimate of the number in the county.

Train Service Interrupted.
There was no connection at Fredericton Junction this morning with the west bound train from St. John and consequently mails and passengers from points east did not read Fredericton until the train connecting with the trains from the west arrived. That train also was late, making it afternoon when mails and passengers arrived.

Want Canadians.
The United States war office has not asked the Canadian government for the services of returned officers to act as instructors with the United States army, as has been published, but requests have come from time to time from educational institutions of the United States asking for the service of returned officers to act as instructors in military training. There are Canadian officers now attached to various educational institutions in the United States for this purpose, and they have done so well that many institutions not having secured an instructor are looking to Canada for men.

Success With Poultry.
A lady who lives in the lower part of the city has achieved quite a success in raising poultry. Last June she was presented with a setting of ten White Wyandotte eggs by Mr. G. W. Brown. She added two to the number and placed them under a Rhode Island Red hen which she bought from a neighbor. The hen brought out eleven chickens from the twelve eggs, and before they were a month old she started laying. She produced more than sufficient eggs to pay for her cost and keep. There were six pullets in the hatch and they started laying on Christmas Day before they were six months old, and have since produced three and four eggs a day. Four cockerels out of five in the flock were killed and dressed five pounds each. The lady in question had no experience with poultry, but feels and rightly too, that she has done fairly well out of it.

ODDUR M. HARTT DIED SUDDENLY AT FT. WAYNE

Founder of the Hartt Boot & Shoe Co. of Fredericton—
Mrs. W. A. Loudoun's a Daughter.

Oddur M. Hartt, a former resident of Fredericton and founder of the Hartt Boot and Shoe Company, which bears his name, died suddenly Sunday morning at his home at Fort Wayne, Ind. This was the purpose of a message conveying the sad news to his son-in-law, Auditor General W. A. Loudoun, received here yesterday.

The late Mr. Hartt was a shoemaker by trade and for some years past was employed as superintendent of a large factory at Fort Wayne. Some months ago he went to St. Louis and accepted a position as inspector under the United States government. It was his duty to look after the output of boots and shoes supplied by a large concern in that city under contract for the army. He was enjoying a few days' rest at his home when death overtook him.

Native of Kingsclear.
The late Mr. Hartt was a native of Kingsclear and was about sixty-five years of age. He is survived by a widow and family of three sons and three daughters, one the latter being Mrs. W. A. Loudoun of this city. His first wife who died some years ago was a daughter of the late Benjamin Kilburn of Kingsclear and half sister of Mr. John Kilburn of this city.

Organized Local Industry.
The late Mr. Hartt was well known in connection with the shoe industry in the Eastern States and Canada. For years he resided at Tarrytown, N. Y., where he was superintendent of a large factory. He also worked at Brockton, Lynn and other shoe centres. In 1899 he came to Fredericton and in conjunction with his brother-in-law, Mr. John Kilburn, Mr. Edward Moore and others organized the Hartt Boot & Shoe Company, which is now Fredericton's foremost industry. He remained in the company's employ as superintendent for several years and then removed to Fort Wayne, where he has since made his home.

The late Mr. Hartt was a man of superb physique and in his younger days enjoyed quite a reputation as an amateur boxer. He was a man of jovial disposition and had a large circle of friends here who will regret to learn of his death.

SAYS SHE FORGED TO GET BUSINESS EDUCATION

Gladys Veno, Arrested in
Moncton, Appeared in the
Police Court Here
Today.

Gladys Veno, aged nineteen years, appeared in the police court here this morning on the charge of forging the name of Mr. J. D. Palmer to a check for forty dollars made out in the name of Ben Comeau and cashed last summer at the dry goods store of J. J. Weddall & Son in this city. The girl was remanded until Wednesday. She was arrested a few days ago in Moncton on instructions from the Fredericton police and was brought here by Chief Finley.

Going to Business College.
The girl when arrested was working under an assumed name in the Atlantic Underwear Mill at Moncton with a friend named Matilda Jardine who achieved some notoriety in Fredericton during the past summer by masquerading as a boy and when arrested refusing to divulge her identity. The Veno girl was attending business college at Moncton three nights a week and according to her own statement had forged the check for the purpose of supplying funds to get a business education. She states also that she was saving money to pay the amount of the check before Mr. Palmer discovered that his name had been forged, and had an amount laid aside for the purpose.

Listened to Bad Counsel.
Friends of the girl in this city say that she listened to bad counsel in the matter of forging the check and believe that her association here with the Jardine girl was responsible. At the time she was a domestic at the residence of Mr. Palmer. Both girls belong to Northumberland county.

Late Mrs. Maggie Donahoe.
The funeral of the late Mrs. Maggie Donahoe took place Sunday from her late home in Marysville. Rev. Dr. Harrison, pastor of the Methodist church at Marysville, conducted the funeral service and interment was made in the Methodist cemetery.
