DEFENDS THE FISCAL SYSTEM OF CANADA

(Canadian Press direct wire.)

Montreal, June 12.—A vigorous defence of the present fiscal system of Canada, a protest against what was styled as the propaganda being waged against manufacturers and a denunciation of the alleged violation of the war time political truce by western grain growers, who are accused of agitating the tariff, form the features of an address delivered this afternoon at the opening session of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, in annual convention at the Windsor Hotel, by S. R. Parsons, Toronto, its president.

Mr. Parsons recommended the appointment of a trade board to confer with the government on tariff changes. A plea for a better relationship between labor and capital in the working out of after-the-war problems was also contained in Mr. Parsons' speech.

AVIATION ACTIVITIES OF THE BRITISH

London, June 12.—The official communication dealing with aviation this evening says:

"Yesterday British airplanes assisted French aviators in a counter attack on the western portion of the Noyon battle front by special patrols sent out to deal with German machines as well as by vigorous and constant bombing of enemy trenches and gun positions.

"Three German airplanes were destroyed and four were driven down out of control. We lost three machines. Two of our machines reported yesterday as missing have returned. On the British front two hostile machines were shot down and two others were driven down out of control. One of our machines is missing. The total weight of bombs dropped by us yesterday amounted to fourteen tons. Tuesday night our night bombing machines heavily attacked the railway works at Cambrai and billets at Fremicourt, without loss to us."

GIRL SHOWS ITALIAN MORALE DURING RAID

Boston, June 12.—"And I said to myself, 'Now it's going to happen.'"

Phillip Allyn, of Cambridge, member of a Boston publishing firm, who has just returned from Italy and France, where as a driver of a Red Cross ambulance in Italy, was speaking.

"She was the daughter of an innkeeper in a little town in Italy where the Red Cross drivers used to get their dinner, on their last ride back at the end of the day. So this particular evening, later than usual, I came in after the inn was shuttered and her mother and sister had left the place. She was frying me eggs and I sat waiting beside the fire, for it was very cold. Then, all at once, I heard the air raid overhead. I looked at the girl and prayed fervently that she might not recognize the sound.

"Well, I shivered, expecting hysterics, and wailings and I know not what. Nearer the airplane came and even nearer, till it was almost overhead. She kept on frying the eggs until, quite near, one bomb exploded. She looked up—in that minute I knew she had known all along. Then I expected the deluge to break. I held my breath—and her laugh rang out into the room.

"The Germans," she said, quite simply.

"Just then a shell exploded right at the side of the house. That fifteen-year-old girl lifted the eggs to the platform, shrugging her shoulder. 'You only have to die once,' she remarked, calmly, as she set my place.

"After the raid had passed we saw that a corner of the very house we were in had been splintered in the raid. I have seen Italian officers run to shelter when the raids were further off than that. Nobody need question the morale of the civilian population of Italy."
