## GENERAL SIR ARTHUR CURRIE PRAISES THE CANADIANS

Says the Boys at the Front are in Fine Fighting Fettle and Anxious to Get at the Huns---Premier Borden Says All Members of His Cabinet are Desirous of Doing Their Duty to the Ccountry.

London June 12—Sir Edward Kemp gave a dinner in honor of premier Borden and his colleagues tonight the guests including general Sir Arthur Currie, who made a remarkable impression in the short address he made. The company consisted entirely of Canadians and included many generals on leave from the front, general Turner, and others of the high command in England.

"When we first came to England," declared General Currie "We were not regarded as the finest soldiers in the world. We had many things unjustly said about us with the consequence that the Canadians went to France determined to prove for their own sake, and for Canada's sake, that Canadians were fit to take their place beside the veteran soldiers of the British army. I want to deny however, that Canadian soldiers, or overseas soldiers, have been placed deliberately in the hottest part of the line, but I will say that the temper of the Canadian soldiers is that there is no position they are asked to take that they will not take. I never knew the Canadian corps to be in finer fighting fettle than tonight. The situation in France is serious. There is no use hiding it. I believe the truth has been hidden too long. The German has struck four mighty blows with success, and it is just a question of how

many blows we can afford to endure.

### Fighting the Hun

"I personally think the factor is that if we can stop and fight the boche we can kill a sufficient number that will make him sick. I believe that is the temper animating the whole army and I know we shall never take such delight in killing him as when we next meet him. The question is now who can stand the longest."

Sir Edward Kemp, in proposing the health of Sir Robert Borden (said the ministers at Ottawa sometimes displayed a misconception of what was going on here. The staff in England, however, were most desirous that every inquiry should be made as to what was done here.

Sir Robert Borden, replying, said, amidst laughter, that there were times when the ministers in Ottawa would be very glad to be three thousand miles away. "There are men in the Canadian government today," continued the premier, "who had been strong political opponents for many years past. I have been associated with them for more than eight months now and I can truthfully say that since the new government was formed there has not been any purpose or intention than the desire to do their duty to their country and to you who are fighting."

with 81½ cents for fine medium. These prices are less freight to Boston, which will amount to about one-half cent per pound, thus giving an average price from 75 cents to 76 cents for wool in the grease.

### Higher at Moncton

The wool accumulated at the Moncton warehouse is grading slightly higher than that at the Fredericton warehouse consequently the wool growers in the Moncton district will receive a higher average price for their wool than those who shipped to the Fredericton warehouse.

The two warehouses at Fredericton and Moncton will continue to take in wool during the entire month of June thus giving those wool growers who have held their wool an opportunity to market through the Cooperative Association.

### Leaving For Winnipeg

Mr. F. P. Wood, teller in the local branch of the Bank of Montreal, has been transferred to Winnipeg and will take his departure for that place tomorrow. It is understood that the change comes to Mr. Wood in the way of a promotion.

### Broadside Launching

St. John Globe, Wednesday: Talking with the Globe this morning about the launching Tuesday of the schooner Dornfontein, Mr. J. Fraser Gregory said while it was the first broadside launching he had heard of in St. John there had been several such in the province. He remembered when a boy in Fredericton seeing several steamers built for the Fredericton-Woodstock trade launched in that way.
