GARDEN SMOCKS.

They are Artistic and are Made to Cover the Gown Completely—Various Colors in Vogue,

How fascinating they are—dainty garden smocks that one sees on busy, patriotic women these days. They make a pleasure of the garden work that must be done by willing hands. For they are artistic and no woman minds working if she knows that she looks picturesque while she is working.

The loveliest smocks are made to cover one's gown completely, so that not a speck of soil from the freshly turned earth can find its way beneath the ample folds of the protecting smock. In pink, blue, lavender, green—striped and figured and plain—the smock is a joy to the eye and a delight to every woman who wears it.

With these smocks are worn the most fetching of sunbonnets in the same materials and the same colors. And one should not forget the oilcloth cushions made to kneel on when weeding the garden.

SOMETHING NEW.

Do you know that charcoal is recommended to prevent the absorbing by milk and other foods of foul gases? It should be freshly powdered and kept in the pantry or ice chest continually, especially in hot weather, when unwholesome odors are most liable to infect the milk.

A teaspoonful of borax put in the last water in which clothes are rinsed will whiten them surprisingly. Pound the borax so it will dissolve easily. This is especially good to remove the yellow that time gives to white garments that have been laid aside.

Salt will curdle new milk. Hence in preparing porridge, gravies, etc., salt should not be added until the dish is prepared.

When boiling rice, add a little lemon juice to the water. This makes the rice white and separates the grains.

ASPARAGUS RECIPES.

Egg Asparagus.

Boil two pounds of asparagus. Cut off tender tops and lay on buttered dish. Put on two tablespoonfuls of melted butter, season with pepper and salt to taste. Boil four eggs just a little and pour over vegetable. Bake about eight minutes in fairly hot oven. Good served with ham cooked in any way.

Asparagus in Sauce.

Cut off tender parts in half-inch strips. Boil until tender. Then drain to two bunches of asparagus, add half a cup of cream and salt to taste. Simmer the mixture until it is reduced to a thick sauce, then serve hot.

WAXING LINOELUM.

After varnishing linoleum, which will preserve it, try waxing it on top of the varnish just as you would polish a hardwood floor. About once a week wipe with clear water and clean cloth and about once in two weeks apply the floor wax, leaving it to dry about 20 minutes, then polish with a dry, soft cloth. The wax will brighten the linoleum and will help to resist wear.

HAT TRIMMING.

Roses have come back for hats. The brims of hats are lined with colored silk. Ribbon trims few hats, but soft silk makes draped crowns.
