FOR THE POULTRY RAISER

How to Prepare a Nest for the Setting Hen
---Should be Located on the Ground if Possible and Covered With a Box---The Transfer of the Hen Should be Made After Dark.

(By A. C. McCulloch, Provincial Poultry Superintendent.)

As most of the chickens hatched in New Brunswick are hatched naturally, that is, by hens, it is well to have a good understanding of the details of the construction of a hen's nest, its

location and the care of a hen during the incubating period.

The nest for the average hen should be 14 or 15 inches square and about the same height. A box of this height and width, but twice as long, with a board four or five inches wide across the box at the base, dividing it into two equal parts, makes a good nest. This box holds the nesting material together and provides a place for the hen to stand if she wishes to go off the nest for a few minutes and you do not wish her to stray away. The nest should be covered, the entrance being in the end opposite where the hen sets. A barrel cut in two parts crosswise, covered, with an entrance in one side, makes a good nest. It is very necessary that the hen be able to walk directly on the nest and have plenty of room in which to turn around. If it is necessary for her to jump down upon the eggs in all probability she will break some of them before the hatch is complete.

Feeding of Broody Hens.

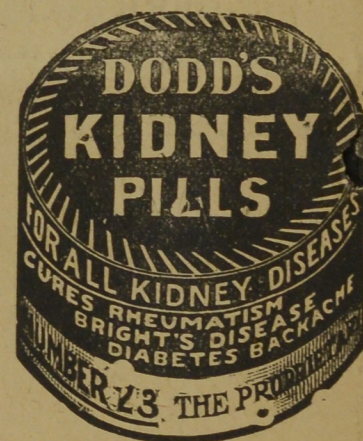
Broody hens do not take their meals regularly and are not particular as to their bill of fare. Probably any kind of grain, but preferably corn or buckwheat, plenty of water, a little grass or other green stuff and a bit of gravel, will suffice. The hen should be allowed off to eat whenever she so desires. It is not often they will leave the nest too frequently if they are good setters.

FINAL DRAFT NOT ACCEPTED.

(Canadian Press direct wire.)

London, Apr. 24. — Germany has not yet accepted the final draft of the peace treaty with Russia, according to a German wireless message received here purporting to give the text of a telegram sent to M. Tchitcherine, the Russian foreign minister, by Adolph Joffe, who has just arrived in Berlin as Bolshevik ambassador. M. Joffe's message reads: "Russian realization of the peace treaty is considered incorrect and nothing is known here of the final draft which is said to have been accepted by Germany."

"Postponement of its publication is requested until the receipt of an authentic translation done here co-jointly by the German ministry and our embassy."

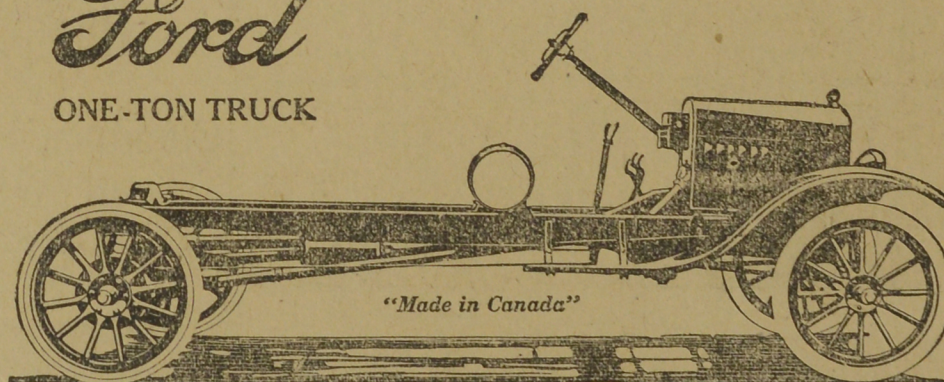
