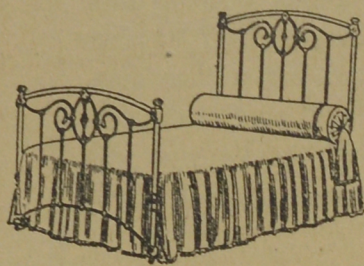

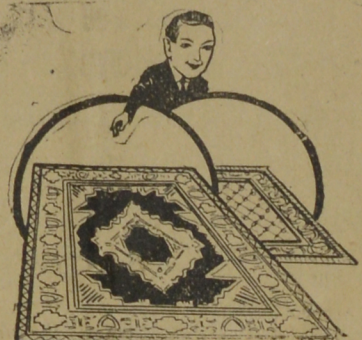

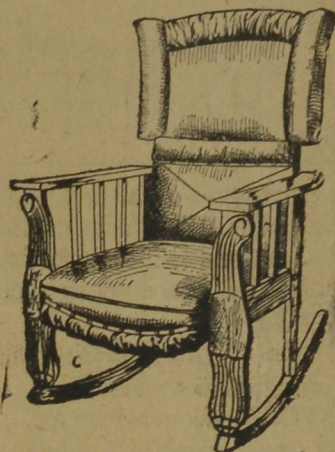

Vocational

several hundred replies. Every reply received was in favor of the establishment of industrial educational facilities, with the exception of one person, who had neglected to sign his or her name.

The system which he, as an individual, would like to see established would include rural schools, county, agricultural and industrial schools, town industrial high schools and, in connection with the University of New Brunswick, a modern technical institution giving opportunity for a more practical education on more advanced lines than it now afforded.

Several members of the Legislature had visited the University of New Brunswick recently and he had been impressed with the development of the curriculum along practical lines, but he wished to see the University progress farther and have facilities second to none in the Maritime Provinces. There were buildings in Sussex and Woodstock, which were not in use, and he would like to see practical schools for agricultural and industrial education established by the municipalities in those buildings. With other members of the committee, he had visited several such schools in the state of Massachusetts and he felt that if such schools could be established in New Brunswick, they would prove of immense value to the province and the people.

One of the difficulties would be in securing properly qualified teachers who should be not only trained in this work, but should also be able to contribute towards the making of better citizens.

He was deeply interested in this work and desired if possible to get the bill through at the present session, so that, if any municipalities wished to take advantage of its provisions, the opportunity would await them.

The bill provided for provincial administration through a Board of Technical Education and for co-operation with the municipality for the estab-

lishment of the schools. The county would be expected to erect, equip and maintain the school and the province would pay one-half of the net cost of maintenance. The province would pay nothing for building or equipping the school.

MR. MURRAY (Kings)—"What grant do you expect from the Dominion?"

MR. MAGEE replied that as yet no grant had been promised. Representations had been made by several provinces, but so far they had been refused. The Federal government granted money for agricultural education. New Brunswick's share this year being something like \$64,000; if the Minister of Agriculture would hand over that amount to the Vocational Education Committee, they would be glad to expend it.

The bill fixed the total contribution which the province might make in any one year at \$50,000. Nova Scotia spent from \$60,000 to \$90,000, but the committee had thought it well to limit the amount for the present; later, the province might be in a position to do better.

One thing he might say that no assistance would be given to Vocational Schools in any town where compulsory attendance at schools was not enforced.

In conclusion he asked the sympathetic consideration of the House to the bill and said that any suggestions which would tend to make it more efficient would be gladly welcomed.

MR. MURRAY (Kings) said he had listened with very much pleasure to the remarks of the hon. member and thoroughly agreed with him that the subject of technical education was one of the most important that had to be faced at the present time. The references he had made to the work of the public schools opened up a very large question and it was to be regretted, he thought, that such a very small proportion of the lower grade pupils ever reached the High School. It seemed to him that the trend of the educational system led more to the universities than to vocational training. He realized that the question of expense was likely to be large but it was pretty well arranged that assistance would be forthcoming from the Dominion government. The work which was being done in the way of imparting elementary agricultural education in the rural schools was bringing excellent results, as it taught children to learn by doing the things instead of reading of them. He would have more to say on the subject when the bill was before the House.

MR. CAMPBELL said he had been struck by the great work that was be-

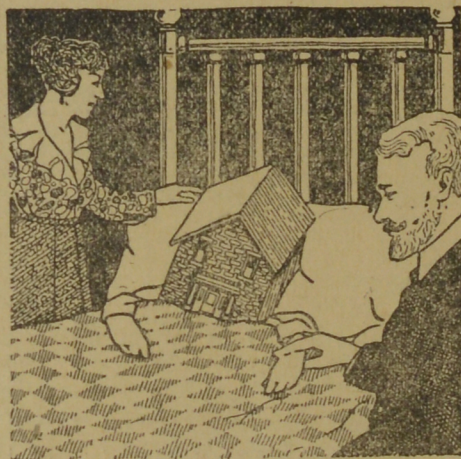

ing done in some of the vocational schools in Massachusetts. These schools were divided into two classes—city and county, where the various departments were adapted to the needs of the local inhabitants. In the agricultural and household science schools pupils were expected to do a great portion of the work at home, a system which was proving very satisfactory. He would like to see, at an early date, one of more of the directors of some of these schools invited to come and address the educational bodies in this province on the subject as he felt that a vast amount of very beneficial information would thereby be obtained.

HON. MR. VENIOT introduced a bill to amend the Act 8 George V., 1917, relating to permanent highways. That act provided for borrowing an

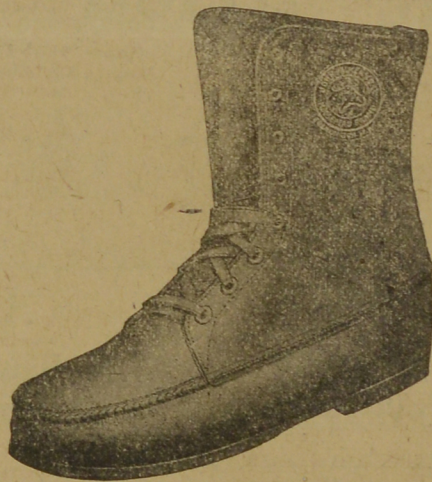
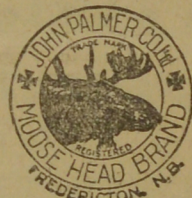

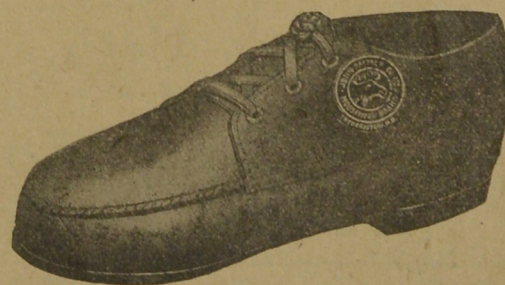
