

### N. B. GROWN NURSERY STOCK IS THE BEST

St. John Valley Nurseries Can  
Promptly Fill All Orders  
for Orchard Trees and  
Fruit Plants.

The time for setting out nursery  
stock will soon be here and in this  
respect The Mail would like to call at-  
tention to the announcement of the  
St. John Valley Nurseries in another  
part of this issue. The company's  
nurseries are located in the parish of  
Burton, Sunbury county, and are con-  
sidered by many to be the finest in  
the Maritime Provinces. The company  
has supplied a large quantity of stock  
to farmers throughout the province  
in recent years and all claims made in  
regard to the same have been more  
than fulfilled. The stock is excep-  
tionally hardy and having been propa-  
gated in the province, gives it a great  
advantage over the article imported  
from other sections where climatic  
conditions are dissimilar.

The company only inaugurated the  
nursery feature some years after they  
established their large and promising  
orchard of 7,000 trees at Burton.  
Throughout the river counties they  
already have many patrons for their  
stock which seems much in favor.  
There seems to be a disposition to en-  
courage home industry and discour-  
age the sending of large sums outside  
of the province for nursery stock  
which can be grown here, thus insur-  
ing the expenditure of the money with-  
in the province.

The facilities for prompt and direct  
shipment from this nursery are very  
exceptional. First of all the nurser-  
y is centrally located and owing to riv-  
er and railway communication, but  
a day or two transpires between the  
shipment and planting of the stock.

Persons desiring nursery stock, par-  
ticularly those about to start or ex-  
tend an orchard, would do well to get  
in touch with this company before or-  
dering stock from elsewhere, and es-  
pecially stock grown in other cli-  
mates. Only a few years ago one  
nursery company with its head office  
in Maine, and dealing in stock grown  
in much warmer climate, sold stock  
to the extent of over \$3,000 in the St  
John valley alone. In many cases in-  
ferior article arrived in the first in-  
stance, and after but a few winters a  
small percentage survived.

Before I turn from the subject of  
the war to topics of a more local in-  
terest, it is my duty to say something  
about food conservation. At the pres-  
ent moment the people of Great Brit-  
ain are upon the strictest rations in  
the hope and expectation that the eco-  
nomy thus effected will tide the coun-  
try over the extremely critical period  
of the next few months. It ought to  
be a point of honor with every one of  
us not only to aid so far as he can the  
greater production movement, but to  
reduce to the minimum in his own  
household the consumption of those  
articles of food which the Food Con-  
troller has asked us in particular to  
conserve.

**Supply of Clergy.**  
There are certain conditions in the  
diocese that have been giving me a  
great deal of anxious thought and  
adding seriously to the problems of  
administration. Chief among these is  
the increasing difficulty as the war  
goes on of maintaining an adequate  
supply of clergy. The number of ac-  
tual vacancies is twelve. From sev-  
eral sources I am looking for some re-  
lief. Rev. H. T. Montgomery, who is  
at present on leave of absence from  
the diocese, hopes to return in the au-  
tumn. As one result of my recent visit  
to England, I was able to make such  
representations to the authorities as

GOOD SEED IS SCARCE. Place your order now, with your County Coun-  
cilor. The Department of Agriculture has ordered 56,000 bushels of oats and  
18,000 bushels of wheat.

Oats will be sold for \$1.32 per bushel, in bulk car lots, or \$1.38 in bags in  
car lots laid down.

Wheat will be sold for \$3.00 per bushel, in bags car lots or f. o. b., distri-  
bution point for smaller orders.

Local freights will be paid by purchaser. County Councillors and Agricul-  
tural Societies should place car lot orders immediately, stating destination for  
cars. Delivery not guaranteed unless orders placed within three weeks, be-  
cause of transportation difficulties.

New Brunswick is expected to bread herself for the duration of the war.
