OF INTEREST TO WOMEN

LITTLE FOLKS' APRON.

Little ones who can sew will find his apron very easy to make either for themselves or a little friend. Dotted Swiss or any thin material makes a very dainty apron.

For a child 8 years old one yard of material is sufficient. Also one yard of insertion and two and one-third yards of ribbon about one and onequarter inches wide is needed. The material should be twenty-four inches wide. Measure the length needed, allowing for a three-inch hem.

Make two tucks at bottom of apron and then sew on the insertion. Make two more tucks above the insertion measure across the chest for the band sew on insertion and plait the mater ial into the band.

Cut the ribbon in half and sew to each end of the band. It goes over the shoulders and is crossed at the back, brought round the waist and tied in front in a bow.

STORING JARS.

Fruit jars bought by the dozen come in heavy corrugated paper boxes. In stead of tearing open the top at the joints, cut around three sides with knife and you have a lid hinged on one in this box, where they will be in the dark and protected to some exten from freezing. As they are emptied wash and put the lid back on again and return to the box bottom upward A glance into the case then shows you how many jars of fruit remain. When ready for storage until next season.

MAPLE BLANC MANGE.

Mix 5 level tablespoons of corn starch with 11/2 cups of maple syrup until smooth, add 1 saltspoon of salt and a half saltspoon of soda, then pou the mixture slowly into 1 quart o utes, stirring frequently; pour it inte small wet molds and serve cold with cream, either plain or whipped. When 1 quarter of this receipt is used, which is enough for a family of two, use the merest suspicion of soda and salt.

ESCALLOPED CORN.

Escalloped corn is the favorite me thod of preparing this popular vege table. Two cupfuls raw corn, cut and scraped from the cob; one egg, one cupful milk, two tablespoonfuls corn chopped green sweet pepper, or mor sugar, salt to taste. Combine, pour in to a buttered baking dish and bake in a good oven until "set" and slightly
