

## APPOINTMENT OF FOREST RANGERS FOR PROVINCE

### MEN WHO WILL GUARD THE PUBLIC DOMAIN

Permanent Appointments Have Been Made by the Department of Lands and Mines.

The result of the recent examination for forest rangers for the Department of Lands and Mines was made public today, by Col. T. G. Loggie, the deputy minister.

Over 200 applications of which 139 presented themselves for examination 63 passed the examinations.

The large number that did not qualify was due to the fact that considerable numbers of the applicants presented themselves for examination that had not sufficient previous experience in scaling.

A considerable number of the 63 were ruled out as being over the age limit of 55 years; also a number declined to accept yearly work, preferring to work only in the winter.

The subjoined list gives the names of those selected that have already accepted positions, and their commissions are being mailed them.

The balance of the rangers will be appointed as soon as replies are received, in regard to offers made them.

#### Scarcity of Coal

So far as can be learned no contracts have yet been awarded for supplying coal to the Post Office and Customs House here for the coming winter. Tenders for a supply were issued in June but nothing has since been heard from them.

#### An Auto Trip

An auto party consisting of Mrs. J. P. Byrne, wife of the Attorney General, Miss K. White, and Mrs. W. S. White of Bathurst arrived in town this morning. Mrs. Byrne has many friends in this city from whom she is receiving a cordial welcome.

#### Will Visit Toronto

Dr. Carter, the Chief Superintendent of Education for New Brunswick is in St. John attending the Board of Education meeting. After the close of these meetings he will spend a two week's vacation in Toronto attending the meeting of the General Synod there.

#### That Stray Moose

The cow moose which has been hanging around the Convalescent Home, and which started to see the town yesterday, has returned to the hospital where it has been very kindly treated. The moose is much emaciated having evidently been wounded early in the summer by some game butcher.

#### Tractor Demonstration

Owing to unfavorable weather the tractor demonstration to have been held at the experimental farm this afternoon has been postponed until tomorrow. It will be held in the afternoon beginning at one o'clock. Many farmers from this section as well as city people are planning to attend.

#### Telephone Censorship

The authorities of the telephone companies have received instructions from the Chief Press Censor, Ottawa, that the transmission of information by telephone regarding the movements of submarines off the coast, or efforts taken by the authorities to restrict these activities, is forbidden until further orders.

#### Death at Traceyville

The death occurred yesterday at the residence of her uncle George Bunker Traceyville, of Miss Stella E. Woods aged twenty-two years. The deceased is survived by her father, one sister and one brother. The funeral will take place Saturday morning at twelve o'clock interment being made at Rusagornish.

#### To Increase Rates

The Royal Commission appointed to adjust differences between the City of St. John and the N. B. Power Company, has granted the Company a temporary increase of rates. Street car tickets will sell at 6 cents instead of 5, and there is to be an increase of 25 per cent in electricity for lighting and one of 37 per cent in electricity for power purposes.

## SOCIAL SERVICE COUNCILS ARE ORGANIZED

### GOOD MEETING HELD IN THE CITY YESTERDAY

A Council for York and Sunbury and Another for the City and Devon are Formed.

Yesterday afternoon and evening a Social Service Convention was called in the Y. M. C. A. Hall. There were representatives in attendance from about twenty different organizations in York and Sunbury counties. Two sessions were held, one in the afternoon at 1.30 and the other at 8 p. m. Rev. J. S. Sutherland of this city occupied the chair and Rev. Mr. Fisher of South Devon acted as secretary of the meeting.

#### Rev. Dr. Shearer

In the afternoon the meeting was addressed by the Rev. Dr. Shearer of Toronto and Rev. Mr. Dowling of St. John. After the address a general discussion took place as to the organization of a council for South Devon. It was resolved to establish a council for York and Sunbury and another for Fredericton and Devon. A committee was appointed to draft a constitution for the councils and to nominate officers for the positions.

#### Councils Organized

In the evening the committee reported a constitution which was adopted for the different councils. The officers were elected as follows: Dr. W. C. Kierstead, President of Council of York and Sunbury; Rev. Mr. Robinson, Mr. Arthur Douglas of Stanley, Rev. Mr. Ainsworth and Rev. Mr. Van Atten of Millville, Vice Presidents; Mr. W. M. Burns of this city, Secretary; and Mr. W. G. Clark, Treasurer. The council of Fredericton and Devon was elected as follows: J. M. Lemont, President; Rev. Dean Neales, Rev. J. S. Sutherland, Mrs. FitzRandolph and Dr. B. C. Foster, Vice Presidents; Rev. Mr. Fisher, Secretary; and W. G. Clark, Treasurer.

#### Social Reform

Dr. Shearer and Rev. Mr. Dowling gave addresses on achievement along the lines of Social Reform that has characterized the life of the last few years and outlined the work to be dealt with in the future. An appeal was made by them for the support of the new magazine called "Social Welfare", the first number of which is to be issued in October by the Dominion Social Service Council. The meeting closed about 10 o'clock and was declared a success because of the encouraging attendance and of the large numbers of visitors present.

## ORGANIZING VICTORY LOAN CAMPAIGN

### SUCCESSFUL MEETING HELD LAST EVENING

Big Drive in York-Sunbury will be Launched October 1st—An Executive Named.

The work of organizing for the next victory loan campaign was well advanced at a meeting held last evening at the Board of Trade rooms. Mr. R. H. Simonds performed the duties of secretary, and the meeting was large, representative and enthusiastic.

The appointment of an Executive Council was made and will consist of Mayor Hanson, J. J. F. Winslow, Archibald Fraser, W. G. Clark, W. E. Farrell, Dr. C. C. Jones, J. S. Neill, Sr., R. FitzRandolph, C. D. Richards, F. B. Edgecombe, J. J. McCaffrey and H. S. Campbell. Mr. J. D. Palmer, chairman, stated the object of the meeting and the amount of money expected to be raised in Canada and especially in the Province of New Brunswick.

Mayor Hanson gave the meeting a very clear account of the proceedings of the Provincial Executive in St. John which he attended a few days ago as one of the representatives from York and Sunbury Counties. A report from the Executive will be called for on the 10th of September at the Board of Trade rooms.

#### To Canvass City

A systematic canvas of the city and district, including the surrounding country and of all York and Sunbury Counties is being arranged for. The arrangements are not yet completed but press notices will inform the public of what is going on from time to time. The Victory Loan Committee have obtained offices on York Street near Queen where their business will be transacted. The Campaign for the sale of bonds will open on October 1st and the committee are already getting machinery into place for the work. It is hoped by the committee that the work will start soon and that good results will be obtained. The committee have worked hard to keep up their end of the business and it is now up to the public to hold up the other end of the compact.

The great war for civilization has got to be won, and the silver bullet is playing and will continue to play an important part until the end.

A collision occurred yesterday on Queen street between two teams. One woman was thrown out of the carriage but was only bruised and not seriously hurt. The occupants of the other carriage were not seriously injured.

From the Milltown items of thirty years ago in the St. Croix Courier, we clip the following: On the first of the week as C. H. Eaton and F. B. Edgecombe were returning from Robinson the evening being very dark so that teams meeting could with great difficulty be seen, a team heading for Robinson collided with them, upsetting and damaging both carriages and throwing the occupants some twenty feet each. C. H. Eaton sustained a great shock, as he was thrown quite a distance from the carriage, and his associate fell on him. The horse ran about four miles and was not apparently injured.
