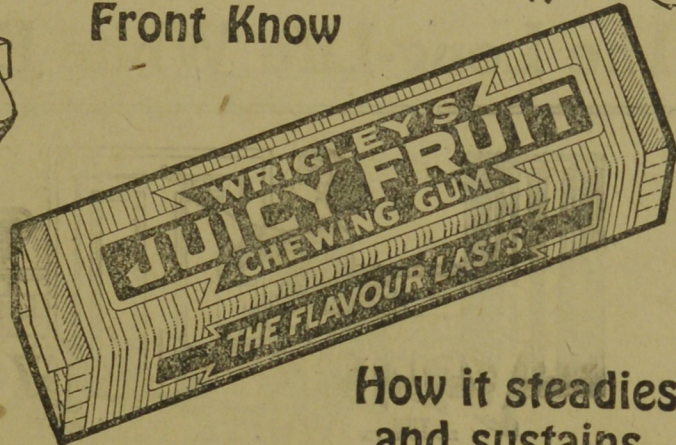

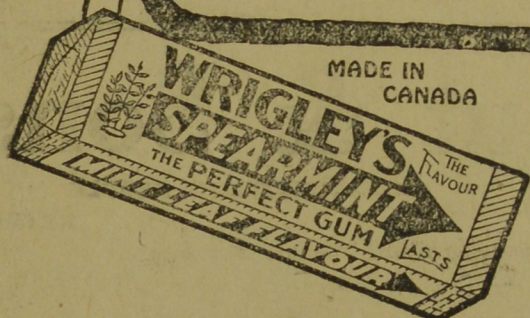

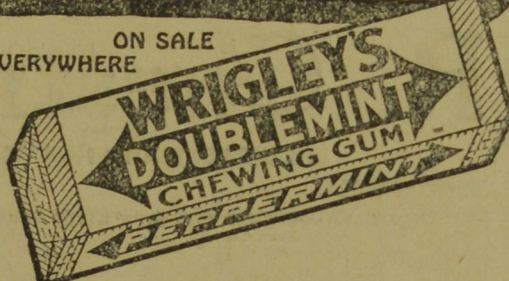

The record of hard work done long ago.

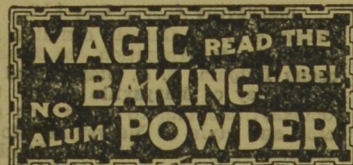
I do not know how wealthy he may be,

Ottawa, Feb. 12.—Reports received here indicate that the work of the special police, in charge of the enforcement of the Military Service Act is progressing generally without serious difficulty. Defaulters under the act are being rounded up not merely in Quebec but in other districts. Captain Douglas Kerr, who has charge of the branches of the Dominion police dealing with Military Service defaulters, has appointed inspectors in each district.

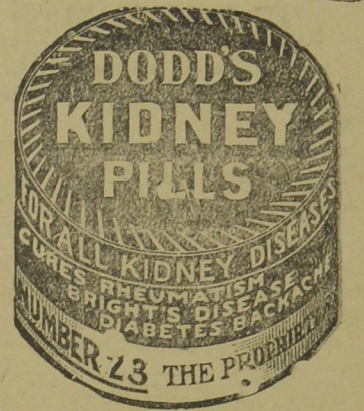
