WIN-THE-WAR RECIPES.

These recipes are issued by the
Fredericton Food Control Committee.

Savory Stew.

2 lbs. meat off the forequarter of
mutton. Into heated kettle place bits
of fat cut from meat. Try out and
remove crackling. (These may be
chipped and used for shortening muffins
or corn cake.)

Into the fat slice three good sized
onions. Cut meat in small pieces,
about two-inch cubes, roll in flour, to
which salt and pepper has been added
in the proportion of 1 teaspoon of
salt and ¼ teaspoon pepper to one-
third cup of flour.

Brown meat with onions in fat.
When well browned, add two quarts
of hot water and 1 tablespoon barley
and flavoring herbs. Let simmer from
one to two hours. Add cut-up vegeta-
bles, not cut too small. Carrots,
turnips and fresh celery, if it can be
obtained, about one quart in all. Cook
about one half hour and then add one
quart of potatoes cut in chunks. Cook
another half hour, when the stew is
ready to serve. During the cooking
keep the amount of water constant by
adding hot water as it evaporates.

Pea Soup.

Liquid from 1 can of peas,
1 small onion.
1 pint milk.
Salt and pepper.
3 tablespoons flour.
3 tablespoons butter.
Celery salt.

Put liquid from peas, milk and onion
in double boiler, scald for half an hour
and remove onion, thicken with but-

recognized the right of hon. members
opposite to criticize, but he wished to

to better any clause of the bill, he
would be only too happy to accept
them.

The bill was read a first time.
Annuity for Mrs. Dickson.
HON. MR. FOSTER introduced a
bill to provide for the payment of an
annuity to Jane Dickson, relict of
Joseph Howe Dickson, late Clerk of
the Executive Council.

HON. MR. FOSTER introduced a
bill to authorize the province to loan
certain moneys to the Board of Public
Utility Commissioners. He ex-
plained that the board had asked for a
loan of \$4,500. The plan of the St.
John Power Company was now being
examined and the law authorized the
board to make a levy upon the Com-
pany. This levy will be made in a
short time and will cover a period of
two or three years. The money to be
loaned by the province was needed
now to defray the cost of the appraisal.
The bill was read a first time.

HON. MR. TWEDDALL laid on
the table of the House the report of
the Director of Elementary Agricul-
tural Education.

MR. CAMPBELL presented a pe-
tition for the passage of an Act relat-
ing to the General Public Hospital, St.
John.

The House went into Committee,
with Mr. Leger (Westmorland) in the
chair, and agreed to the bill to enable
cities, towns and municipalities to
assess for aid granted to the City of
Halifax. The bill legalizes all munici-
pal grants made in aid of the sufferers
from the disaster of December
6th.

The House adjourned at 4.30 p.m.

Notice is hereby given, that appli-
cation will be made at the next session
of the Legislature of the Province of
New Brunswick for the passage of an
Act to incorporate the New Brunswick
Western Railway Company, with a
capital stock of \$400,000.00, with power
to build and operate a line of railway
from a point on the River Saint John
in the County of York between Med-
dick and Pokok and a point in the
Parish of North Lake in the said
County at or near the head of North
Lake, being on the international bound-
ary between the United States of Amer-
ica and the Dominion of Canada, and
there to connect with the Eastern
Maine Railroad chartered by the Leg-
islature of the State of Maine, with all
the usual powers incidental thereto,
and with authority to acquire by pur-
chase or otherwise, and own, operate
and sell hydro-electric power and en-
ergy for all purposes.

Gingerbread.

½ cup melted butter or butterine,

cup of cold water,
1 teaspoon vinegar,
1 egg,
1 cup white flour after sifting,
¼ cups graham flour,
½ teaspoon cinnamon,
1 teaspoon ginger,
¼ teaspoon cloves.

Mix ingredients in order given, mix-
ing spices with flour; beat well; bake
in rather shallow pan. Approximate
