**Will Accommodate Returned
Tubercular Soldiers—The
Standing Rules Com-

IMPORTANT RESOLUTIONS BY F. & D. ASSOC.

**DELEGATES TODAY AT
EXPERIMENTAL FARM**

**Addresses by W. R. Reek and
J. H. Grisdale—Want Oleo-
margarine Prohibited
After the War.**

The Farmers' and Dairymen's Association held an important session this morning at which two interesting addresses were heard and a large number of important resolutions passed. This afternoon the delegates are at the Dominion Experimental Farm where a number of interesting demonstrations are being held.

Addresses This Morning.

Mr. W. R. Reek, Deputy Minister of Agriculture, was one of the speakers this morning, his subject being "Greater Production." He emphasized the necessity for increased acreage and production as a war measure and outlined the steps the Provincial Department of Agriculture had taken to aid in that. Mr. J. H. Grisdale of Ottawa, Director of Dominion Experimental Farms, spoke on Pig Raising and gave some excellent advice.

Resolutions Passed.

After discussion on a number of subjects the resolutions reported to the Association by the Committee on Resolutions were passed. The resolutions were against Daylight Saving, in favor of a law to prevent the running at large of bulls, urging the provincial government to give a bonus of twenty-five per cent. on gang plows bought in the province as an aid to greater production, that the Federal government guarantee a price of twenty cents per pound for pork during the next two years, that there be a greater degree of practical agricultural education in the schools of the province, condemning the Food Controller, urging that the millers be compelled to abandon their policy of forcing the purchase of flour together with every lot of feed, urging that the restrictions on the importation, manufacture and sale of oleomargarine be restored immediately on the conclusion of the war.

The respective resolutions were as follows:

Resolved, That this association believes it to be in the best interest of both producer and consumer of dairy products, immediately upon the conclusion of the war, to rescind the present order-in-council which allows as a war measure only, importation, manufacture and sale of oleomargarine in Canada, and respectfully petitions the Federal Minister of Agriculture through the Federal Government again to put into force the restrictions against oleomargarine as they appear in the Dairy Industry Act.

GOVERNMENT HEARD LABOR DELEGATION

**CONSIDERATION IS
PROMISED THE REQUESTS**

**Federation on Third Day of
Annual Meeting—Officers
Elected—Resolutions
Passed.**

The delegates from the New Brunswick Federation of Labor appointed at yesterday's session to wait upon the Provincial Government were before that body today. The delegation urged upon the Provincial Executive the enactment of certain legislation of interest to organized labor of the province and made suggestions in connection with other legislation which it is expected will be introduced before the legislature.

The matters discussed were The Workmen's Compensation Act, the proposed Industrial Disputes Act, free text books and appliances for public schools up to Grade VIII, the proposed Department of Public Health, amendment of the Intoxicating Liquor Act 1916 so as to permit of the sale and manufacture of light beers containing an alcoholic percentage of two and one-half.

Premier Foster promised that consideration would be given the matters advanced by the delegation. The latter was composed of President Sugrue, Delegates Tighe, Kemp, McDonald, Melanson, Wilson, Stone and Crawford.

Officers Elected.

The Federation elected officers yesterday afternoon. They are as follows:

President, James L. Sugrue, St. John, re-elected; vice president, C. J. Melanson, Moncton; vice president for Moncton, F. C. Wilson; vice president for Fredericton, George C. Crawford; vice president for St. John, J. E. Tighe; secretary-treasurer, P. D. Ayer, Moncton.

Yesterday afternoon the Federation passed a number of important resolutions. One was in favor of provincial legislation bringing about proportional representation in provincial, municipal and civic governing bodies.

Another was in favor of the Federal government's taking over and operating all railways and similar public utilities. The Federation also passed a resolution to the effect that the motor vehicle law should be amended so as to make it imperative that all licensed chauffeurs pass an examination.

All organized labor bodies were urged to encourage and promote the use of the union label particularly on government printing.

The Federation is now on the third day of its meeting, business increasing to such an extent that an extra day is required. The meeting probably will close this afternoon.

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
