

## TWENTIETH DEATH IN CITY OF PNEUMONIA

**H. O'DONNELL, OF MINTO,  
DIED WHILE ON A VISIT**

**Another Death on Oromocto  
Reserve—Two Other Se-  
rious Cases—Hospital  
at Hampstead.**

Little change in the influenza situation in Fredericton occurred over the week-end but indications still point to the disease subsiding. The twentieth death in the city from pneumonia following influenza occurred this morning when Harry O'Donnell of Minto succumbed to the disease after a brief illness. The deceased had come here from Minto on account of illness in the family of his brother-in-law Mr. John Swift and while here contracted the disease. The body was taken to Minto this morning for interment.

### Severe in Country Districts

The influenza although showing signs of decreasing in Fredericton still has a firm grip on the country districts. Over the week-end deaths were reported from Millville, Prince William, Douglas and New Market.

### Conditions on Indian Reserves

Indian Agent B. J. Griffiths reports one death among the Indians at Oromocto, the five-year-old child of James Polchies having passed away. At Hampstead a railroad construction camp has been cleaned and fitted up with cots and bedding. It is warm and comfortable and six Indians with pneumonia have been removed from the tents to the improvised hospital. One child of the late Stephen Muise is very ill and Mrs. Isaac Paul is almost beyond hope. One other case is serious. The rest of the cases are on the mend and with proper care and treatment improvement is rapidly taking place. At Woodstock the doctor in charge of the Indians is himself sick and unable to report anything. At the Devon Reserve all are improving except two cases which are serious, Mrs. Daisy Brooks and her grandchild Joe Sacobie.

Orders have been issued that no more recruits will be called up under the Military Service Act until the epidemic of Spanish influenza subsides.

### Joins Royal Air Force

Capt. G. H. Lounsbury of St. John has been gazetted to the Royal Air Force. He formerly resided in Fredericton.

### Deaths at Millville

Shirley Agnes Hay, infant daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Wendall K. Hay, of Millville, died Sunday of pneumonia. She leaves her parents and one little brother. The child was aged two years. Mrs. Hay formerly was Miss Stella Burden of Fredericton. The funeral took place today.

### War Souvenirs From France

Mr. Johnson McKenzie of this city is in receipt of several souvenirs of the war sent home by his son Gunner William McKenzie. Included among the souvenirs were numerous German notes of five marks, a German belt with shrapnel holes in it and a German jack-knife of some size.

### Death of Rev. J. E. Wilson

Rev. J. E. Wilson, pastor of the Woodstock United Baptist church, died Sunday night at 6 o'clock after a brief illness of pneumonia and other complications. He is survived by his wife and one son. The deceased, prior to taking the Woodstock pastorate, was pastor of the George Street Baptist church in this city and news of his death comes as a shock to those in this city who knew him. In his pastorate here and at Woodstock the late Rev. Mr. Wilson proved himself an able pastor and eloquent preacher.

## TWO SONS REPORTED AT SAME TIME AS CASUALTIES; REV. MR. LOVE OF FREDERICTON RECEIVES NEWS

**Private Cecil Love, on Service Since August 1914 Admitted to  
Hospital Shell Shocked, and Private Stuart Love Wounded  
—Gunner Temple Sutherland Shell Gassed—Private Er-  
nest Horncastle Had Leg Shattered and was Carried to  
Dressing Station by Two German Prisoners.**

Among the casualties in the last week are Privates Cecil and Stuart Love, the two sons of Rev. J. J. and Mrs. Love of this city. Private Cecil Love is reported shell shocked and Private Stuart Love is reported wounded in the leg. Mr. and Mrs. John Horncastle have received a letter from their son Gunner Martin Horncastle explaining the circumstances of his being wounded. Mr. and Mrs. Alexander Boyd have received a letter from their son Gunner Gordon Boyd explaining the nature of his wounds. Mr. John Horncastle has received a letter from his son Private Ernest Horncastle giving the nature of his wounds. Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Sutherland have received word that their son Gunner Temple Sutherland was admitted to hospital having been gassed. Mr. and Mrs. Saunders Patterson and Mr. and Mrs. John Lounsbury have received reports that their sons who have been seriously ill in England are improving.

### Private Cecil Love Shocked

Rev. J. J. Love has received news that his son Private Cecil Love was admitted to hospital on October 10th, slightly shell shocked. Private Love left here in 1914 with the first volunteers from the 71st York Regiment but was transferred to a battalion of Highlanders with whom he went to France. He has seen about four years' service.

### Private Stuart Love

Word was also received that his brother Private Stuart Love was admitted to hospital on October 12th suffering from gunshot wounds in the leg. Private Love enlisted and went overseas with the Depot Battalion from St. John last January. He was transferred to the 13th Reserve Battalion in England. Shortly after being transferred he went to France.

### Gunner Temple Sutherland

Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Sutherland received official notice yesterday that Gunner Temple E. Sutherland was admitted to No. 4 General Hospital at Basingstoke, England, on October 28th suffering from shell gas. Gunner Sutherland left with the 9th Siege Battery about last Christmas. On arriving in England he was transferred to an artillery unit. On August 1st he arrived in France.

### Carried in By Huns

Mr. Harry Horncastle has received a letter from his son Private Ernest Horncastle stating that he was wound-

ed on October 1st at 5.30 o'clock just as he was going over the top in a charge. He states that he had his left leg shattered below the knee and that two Huns were forced to carry him to the dressing station. In his letter he states that he is glad to get back to Blighty and is now improving. He is in hospital in England.

### Gunner Martin Horncastle

A letter has been received by Mr. and Mrs. John Horncastle from their son Gunner Martin Horncastle who was wounded on October 3rd. Gunner Horncastle was wounded in the head by a piece of the same shell that killed Gunner Walter Adams of this city. He was taken to a Field Dressing Station to have his wounds attended to and for a time after that his relatives received telegrams that he could not be located. He writes that he is in a Salvation Army Hospital is receiving good care and is coming around all right.

### Gunner Gordon A. Boyd

A letter was received on Saturday by Mr. and Mrs. Alexander Boyd from their son Gunner Gordon Boyd stating the nature of his injuries. He states that he was wounded on Oct. 9th at 4 a. m. with shrapnel in the shin, ankle, upper leg and thigh. He writes a very cheery letter and says he is better off than a number of others. He is improving and is doing well. Gunner Boyd left with the 9th Siege Battery but was transferred on arriving in England.

### Lieut. W. H. Patterson Improving

Mr. and Mrs. Saunders Patterson received a telegram this morning stating that their son Lieut. Ward H. Patterson was improving. Lieut. Patterson was admitted to hospital on October 1st with enteric fever. He went overseas with a Western battalion. One brother Miles was killed in action about a year ago.

### Gunner Wm. Lounsbury Improving

A telegram was received by his parents this morning stating that Gunner William Lounsbury who was admitted to hospital in England was improving. Gunner Lounsbury left this side with a draft from the 65th Field Battery. He was admitted to hospital seriously ill on October 14th. His parents who have been very anxious on account of his illness are relieved of a load of anxiety by the telegram.

The monthly meeting of the Provincial Government will begin in this city on Wednesday.

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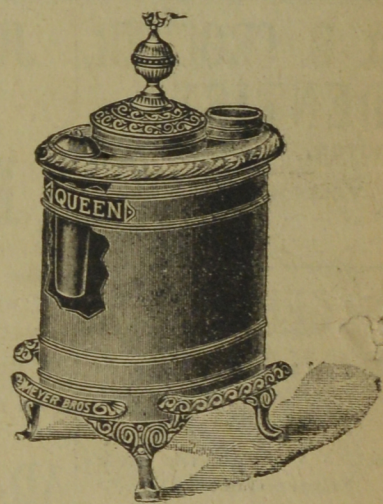
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### Died From Pneumonia

The death of Arnold Whitlock took place on Saturday at his home Miramichi Road after a brief illness of pneumonia. He was thirty-seven years of age and is survived by his wife and four small children, also mother and father, four sisters and two brothers. The funeral took place this afternoon leaving the house at two o'clock. Rev. Mr. Fisher conducted the service and interment was made at Sunny Bank Cemetery.

### Death at New Market
