## CHANGE MADE IN OFFICIALS UNDER PROHIBITION ACT

(St. John Telegraph)

An important change has been made in the workings of the Prohibition Act in New Brunswick, according to an announcement, yesterday afternoon, by Rev. W. D. Wilson, chief inspector for the province, to The Telegraph. T. T. Mann, who has had charge of the machinery in the northern counties of the province has been for the time being, transferred to St. John where he will immediately start a vigorous campaign against the illegal selling of liquor and for a more rigid enforcement of the law.

One result of the change was that Sub-inspectors Crawford and Ross tendered their resignations last evening.

Chief Inspector Wilson, speaking of the change to The Telegraph said that it had been deemed necessary in the interests of prohibition that re-organization of parts of the machinery in connection with the work take place and that the beginning of this was to be right in St. John. Mr. Wilson said that he had picked a man who attained the best results of any sub-inspector in the province and from now until further notice Mr. Mann would have the enforcement of the prohibition law in this city having with him Sub-inspectors Crawford and Ross. Mr. Wilson intimated that Mr. Mann would oversee practically all the work under a new system to be inaugurated.

Speaking of the general everyday work of the act Mr. Wilson explained

that the demands of his office as chief inspector had become too bulky and the new move had been made to create a more equal balancing of the responsibility and workings of the act. Reports of complaints will be handled by Mr. Mann, the inspector said. He further stated that a new system of itemizing all cases and the history thereof had been inaugurated by Mr. Mann, which was now finding results throughout the province, especially along the lines of efficiency and economy. Speaking of the merits of the new appointee the chief inspector said that he was a careful, judicious and far-seeing official and he looked for telling results. Mr. Mann can speak both French and English well. He was formerly chief of police at Campbellton.

Asked as to why an additional official had been placed here, Mr. Wilson remarked, "We are after results and we want to make St. John much dryer than it is at present." The inspector suggested that a general "clean-up" was about to be started and St. John was to be the starting place of the campaign.

Announcement of the resignation of Sub-inspectors Crawford and Ross was made last night by the officials themselves. They would state no reason for their action but said that inferences could plainly be drawn. Inspector Crawford was appointed in April, 1917, before the saloons were closed and Inspector Ross was appointed last March.
