

TIMBER LIMIT SALE HAS BEEN CANCELLED

ANNOUNCEMENT MADE
TODAY BY COL. LOGGIE

Cancellation Comes Rather as
Surprise—Further Informa-
tion to be Given—One
of Biggest Sales.

The announcement was made this morning by the New Brunswick Department of Lands and Mines that the big sale of Crown Land timber limits advertised to take place on Thursday of next week September 5th, had been cancelled and would not take place. Col. T. G. Loggie, Deputy Minister of Lands and Mines, stated that further information on the subject would be given the public later.

Rather a Surprise

The announcement that there will be no sale of Crown Land limits came as a surprise as the sale was advertised in newspapers in all parts of the province and would have been the biggest sale of its kind in some years. About four hundred square miles was to be offered of which one hundred and six square miles was on the Training Ground Reserve near McGivney Junction with an estimated stand of fifty-four million feet.

The Salvation Army picnic is being held today at Pine Grove, Marysville and several motor cars are carrying the picnickers from the city to that place.

The friends of Miss Thelma Walker daughter of Mr. Harry Walker of this city united in giving a linen shower in her honor last evening at her home on Brunswick Street. Miss Walker is to be married to Mr. Wm. Keenan of Moncton on September 4th.

Will Reside Here

Mrs. Robert Hallett of Millville has purchased the fine farm of Mrs. Charles Key at Island View, Kingsclear, and will take possession this autumn. It is the intention of Mrs. Key to take up her residence in Fredericton.

Left for Toronto

Lieut. Charles H. Edgecombe of the Royal Flying Corps who has been on furlough here has been notified by wire to report for duty at Toronto and left for that city last evening. Lieut. Edgecombe has been having a very pleasant vacation at his home here. He expects soon to leave for overseas.

Dog Killed by Auto

A spaniel owned by a returned soldier, Morris Shea, was cut to pieces by a car yesterday afternoon on Queen St. E. The occupants of the car did not stop to see what damage was done but drove hastily away. The dog had been purchased by the soldier but a few minutes before. This is another case of reckless driving.

Kicked by a Horse

Joseph Lifford, a young lad employed by the Western Union Telegraph Co., as messenger met with a painful accident last evening. While leading a horse to pasture he was kicked in the face and badly cut. He was found in the field by a friend and not until early this morning did he regain consciousness.

Disturbers of the Peace

The peaceful inhabitants of Barker's Point were aroused from their sweet slumbers early Sunday night by the sound of six revolver shots in quick succession that rent the quiet air of a clear and beautiful night. Two young men were seen and it is thought by many they might have fired the shots that caused the excitement in the otherwise quiet and law-abiding community.

Had Shoulder Dislocated

The Williams Standard Shows left two classes of wrecks in Fredericton, the grounds at the Officers' Square and a Bulgarian from Minto. The Bulgarian went on against the wrestler with the show and in a bout with him dislocated his shoulder. As he is unable to work for some time he has made application to Chief of Police Finley to grant him the necessary extension to his papers to enable him to remain in this vicinity for some time.

Recent Casualties

Among the Canadian casualties recently reported are Private Arthur Frederick Kingston of York Mills reported killed in action, August 12th. Private Alfred Savoy of Lower Neguac reported died of wounds, August 23rd and Private Ray Basil Estey, son of Mrs. R. J. Estey of Zealand Station reported missing August 14th. Lieut. Charles J. Mersereau, son of Ald. J. Y. Mersereau of Chatham and brother of Major Cecil Mersereau of Fredericton is reported killed in action.

LABOR PROBLEM IS REACHING A SOLUTION

GRAIN CROP CAN BE
HANDLED ALL RIGHT

Importation of Labor for Potatoes Harvest Likely—Nova Scotia Can Furnish Some Men.

Information received by the Department of Agriculture of New Brunswick is to the effect that the farmers of New Brunswick will be able to take care of the excellent grain crop without importation of labor but the potato crop will probably call for extra help. At both Woodstock and Chatham there have been inquiries for labor at the departmental bureaus and labor is offering at several of the bureaus. Labor also can be secured from Nova Scotia, men who formerly went to the Canadian West in the autumn being available.

Fruit Growers' Executive

The executive of the New Brunswick Fruit Growers' Association met here last night and considered the matter of efficient marketing of the early apple crop of New Brunswick. Duchess and Alexander are the varieties which it is desired to market soon. It is estimated that about one thousand barrels will be shipped from Fredericton and St. John. The chief market will be in Montreal. Arrangements were made for a supply of barrels and for expert packers. Those at the meeting were S. B. Hatheway, W. B. Gilman, and George Danby. Apples are a light crop. J. W. Clark of Maugerville will be a heavy shipper. Careful spraying of orchards has produced good results this year. Next season the uniform apple barrel will be in use.

Demonstrations of Tractors

Demonstrations of tractors for farm purposes will begin next week. The first will be at Florenceville Tuesday September 5th, and the second at the Dominion Experimental Station, Fredericton, Friday September 6th. Other demonstrations will be held at Sussex September 10th and at Bathurst September 13th. Five different makes of machines will be demonstrated. The tractor bought by the department has been sold and a large number of various makes have been purchased throughout the province by farmers.

Pig and Poultry Fairs

The Pig and Poultry Clubs organized by the Agricultural Department will hold their annual fairs shortly. There will be seventeen or eighteen of these fairs. School fairs also will begin early in September. Nasonworth and Keswick are the places nearest to Fredericton which will have fairs of these classes.

COMMISSION ISSUED ORDERS TO THE CHIEF

TRAFFIC REGULATIONS
WILL BE ENFORCED

Police Ready for Prosecutions and Information is Laid—No More Cycling on Sidewalks.

The Fredericton Police Commission met yesterday afternoon and issued definite orders to Chief W. H. Finley of the city police that the laws governing traffic in the city streets are to be enforced to the letter in the future. This action was taken on account of the numerous complaints that motorists were driving recklessly about the streets and that accidents had been narrowly averted.

Riding of Bicycles

The riding of bicycles on the sidewalks which is prohibited by law also is to be stopped. The bylaw with regard to this has been rather a dead letter recently with the result that cyclists have acted as if they had more right on sidewalks than pedestrians. Waterloo Row has been particularly favored by cyclists and several complaints have come from there.

The police already have laid information in a number of cases of traffic law violations and of riding bicycles on the sidewalk. It is probable that there will be hearings before Police Magistrate Limerick in a few days.

Leaving for West

Miss Verna Baird, daughter of Mr. H. P. Baird of this city, will leave this evening for Winnipeg, to resume her teaching duties in that vicinity. She will be accompanied by her sister Miss Margaret Baird, who has had several years' experience in teaching in this province and who goes to accept a position in Manitoba.

Needless to say his plans fell to pieces. He was discovered by a policeman and forced to take the flour back to the grocer from whom he had purchased it.
