TARDY JUSTICE DONE THIS PROVINCE AT THE FRONT

New Brunswick to Have Second Battalion ---Unit Nominally From Manitoba is Composed of Soldiers From This Province --- Canadian Casualties Numerous But Majority Are Slight Wounds

With the Canadian Forces, 2 p. m., Sept. 11—The Boche made a raid across the Canal du Nord in some force last night from Sauchy-Cauchy and established a post southeast of Escourt but failed to get prisoners which doubtless he was after. This is a very warm corner for our troops defending, but elsewhere our line is quiet. The weather continues abominable, but as it served our purpose during the month of victory there is not much cause to complain.

New Brunswick Battalion

The legitimate grievance of New Brunswick that the number of the troops contributed by that province were not adequately represented by distinctively New Brunswick units in the field because its drafts largely went to reinforce western battalions, is now in process of redress, as a battalion hitherto recognized as Manitoban though with a preponderance of "Blue Noses" is now set aside for that province. All New Brunswick drafts will go there and in process of time the Manitoba members will be drafted into other Manitoba battalions.

Many Slight Casualties

The western brigadier wounded while making a reconnaissance is now reported back for duty. As the majority of casualties were from machine guns, the proportion of slightly wounded is exceptionally large and the ratio of dead to the total small. Most of the seriously wounded have been evacuated from the Canadian casualty clearing stations to England.

Our total casualties are not more than three thousand above our total prisoners for the month. The loss in the Amiens fighting was a trifle in excess of our loss before Arras.

Weather Conditions

The brave French armies still continue to augment the gains of the Amiens victory in this sector. Weather conditions for the moment have stopped offensive operations on a considerable scale relative to the double crushing blow inflicted on the enemy and the wonderful effect it had on the Allies' morale all along the line. The casualties of the Canadian Corps are regrettable though they are and can only be regarded as, moderate.

The news contained in the above despatch, that New Brunswick is to have another representative battalion at the front, will be received with satisfaction throughout the whole province. It has long been a grievance as the despatch points out with New Brunswickers, that although there was another battalion, outside of the 26th almost completely made up of officers and men from New Brunswick it was known as a Manitoba regiment. The name will be changed and in due course the Manitoba members will be transferred to western battalions. It will be with feelings of pride that the people of

this province can now claim two fighting regiments from their own province. New Brunswick will now get a fair share of credit for supplying fighting men.

An officer of district headquarters when informed of the creation of another New Brunswick unit said that it undoubtedly would be a splendid move. A regiment made up almost wholly of New Brunswickers, both as regards officers and men, had no right to be named a Manitoba battalion, he said.

"It will be a mighty good thing for the men themselves and there will be aroused the same spirit as has been evidenced throughout the exploits of the famous 26th," he said.

Asked if this move would necessitate a special call for officers, he said that there were many New Brunswick officers in England at present who were awaiting their chance to proceed to France. This would afford them a good opportunity. They could now go across with drafts as reinforcements to a battalion from their own province.

WOULD STOP SUNDAY SALES OF GASOLINE

(Dr. W. M. Rochester.)

That the sale of gasoline on Sunday is unnecessary we have all along contended, some in authority and many others holding to the contrary. In conference with those in the business in many places and in particular in recent correspondence with those of Toronto, we have had emphatic confirmation of our view. Now support is coming from unexpected quarters. A leading paper says it is no more necessary than the sale of bread on Sunday. Quite a number of dealers in various parts have combined to discontinue Sunday sales.

The example of the Fuel Administration in the United States in requesting that gasoline be not used on Sunday by motorists that a vital war supply may be conserved, is having its effect in Canada. Motorist associations are calling upon their members to eliminate Sunday use of motor cars. Garage owners are acting independently and in concert to stop Sunday sales and repair work with a view to conservation.

"Well done," we say in the interest of 'gas,' but more emphatically in the interest of men. Why, before the war or since, apart from the example of the United States, people could not see that this form of Sunday trade was unnecessary and deprived hundreds of employees of Sunday rest, seems incomprehensible to us. Now that the light has dawned, let there be no half-way measures. Stop Sunday sale completely, except in case of emergency, everywhere and permanently.

In the United States the disposition to use for pleasure a motor car on Sunday is being effectively discouraged by the application to offenders of the epithet "slacker." "Give up your Sunday pleasure," say they, "and win the war."

The Lord's Day Alliance uses no epithets, but urges cease Sunday selling and buying. The Alliance furnishes large cards reading "Buy your gasoline Saturday," to all dealers upon application.

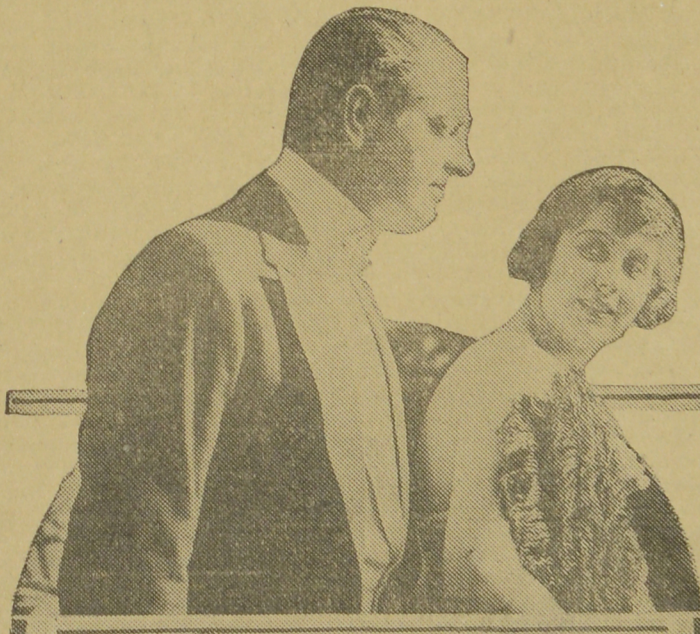
