The western brigadier wounded while making a reconnaissance is now reported back for duty. As the majority of casulties were from machine guns, the proportion of slightly wounded is exceptionally large and the ratio of dead to the total small. Most of the seriously wounded have been evacuated from the Canadian casualty clearing stations to England. Our total casualties are not more than three thousand above our total prisoners for the month. 
