MR. COGSWELL DISCUSSES OROMOCTO SHOOTING AFFRAY

Father of the Victim Says That Published Reports Were Misleading--Declares His Son Had No Intention of Evading the Law--Thinks the Military Police Acted Rather Hastily in the Matter.

Mr. George A. Cogswell, a well known farmer of Oromocto, was in the city, on Tuesday to visit his son, Colby Cogswell, who is now in hospital here suffering from a bullet wound received while in a clash with the military police a few days ago.

Mr. Cogswell during his stay in the city called at the Mail Office and made a statement in regard to the recent shooting affray, with the object as he said of "correcting some erroneous reports which have been given publicity through the press." He said that his two sons, Colby and George, never had any notion of evading Military service. They reported in June in the regular way, and then hired with one Marvin Nason to get out lumber and pulpwood. They were assured by Nason that everything would be all right, and that they would be notified when wanted for military service. They worked for Nason for some weeks, but became dissatisfied because he would not pay them and finally left him.

Clash With Police

Mr. Cogswell claims that Nason, in order to get square with the boys put the military police on their track. He says that the police were led by Nason to a scow where the boys were sleeping, and that they were rather rudely routed out of bed. He says strong language was used by the police and that, without stopping to look for papers they set upon the boys. One of the officers grappled with Colby and during the struggle the latter was shot in the back. Mr. Cogswell admitted that there was a knife on the scow but claims that it was in a sheath and that Colby made no attempt to use it on the officer.

Not a Square Deal

Mr. Cogswell is of the opinion that Nason and the Military Police are to blame for the whole trouble. He does not think they gave his boys a square deal. "I am a law abiding citizen" said Mr. Cogswell, "and I am anxious that my boys should do what is right, but I don't think they have had fair play in this matter. What I have told you is the truth and I am willing to go before a magistrate and make oath to it."

Mr. Cogswell makes his home on the Oromocto River and is well known throughout the parish of Burton. He had the misfortune to lose his

wife some years ago and his eldest daughter who then became his housekeeper also took sick and died. "I was left with a family of children on my hands", he told the Mail, "but I have managed to keep my home together. When left without a housekeeper I rolled up my sleeves and went into the flour barrel myself. I have had a bitter struggle against fate, but I am not complaining. I regret this trouble with the military police and you will do me a great favor by making public the real facts of the case."
