OF INTEREST TO WOMEN

ESCALLOPED POTATOES.

Pare and slice potatoes thin. Butter
an earthen pudding dish, put in a lay-
er of potatoes and season with salt
peper, butter, and a little flour and
add another layer of potato; continue
until the dish is full, and pour a cup-
ful of milk over all. Bake three-quar-
ters of an hour.

COOKED SALAD DRESSING.

One-quarter tablespoon mustard, ¼
tablespoon salt, 2 tablespoons flour, 1
tablespoon sugar, ¾ cup of sweet milk
½ teaspoon cayenne pepper, 4 table-
spoons cottage cheese, ¼ teaspoon
soda, 2 eggs, 2 tablespoons butter, ½
cup vinegar.

Rug together the dry ingredients
and add egg yolks slightly beaten.
Add melted butter, cold milk, and
hot vinegar in the order named, stir-
ring until perfectly smooth. Cook the
mixture in a double boiler until thick-
ened. To the stiffly beaten whites of
eggs add 4 tablespoons of cottage
cheese, which has first been neutral-
ized with the soda, and fold this mix-
ture into the cooked dressing. Set
the pan into a bowl of cold water and
beat well until cool and smooth.

PRACTICAL HINTS

An easy way to remove a splinter
is to hold the finger or injured part
over a bottle nearly full of hot water.
Press the flesh firmly down upon the
mouth of the bottle, and the heat and
steam will draw the flesh into the
neck of the bottle and bring the buried
splinter to the surface. You might try
this over the spout of a teakettle.

When your serge skirt gets shiny
try pressing it with a piece of self-
material. Wet the piece of serge and
lay it over the shiny part. Press with
a hot iron. The skirt and material will
stick together but in pulling them
apart you will raise the nap of the
shiny serge and make it look fresh
and unworn.

If the ticking of your watch annoys
you at night, but you need it near you
place it under a tumbler, and the tick
is silenced, but the watch is still in
sight.

Don't try to pour liquid into the
mouth of a small bottle without a
funnel. If you have none small enough
use an eggshell with a small hole
bored in the bottom.

Hang small pieces like handker-
chiefs, collars, etc. that have been
washed in a small bag. They will
not get lost and dry just as easily this
way.

An easy way to finish seams and
one which is decorative as well is to
blanket-stitch them with embroidery
cotton.

To keep buttons that have been re-
moved at laundry time from getting
lost string them on a hair pin, and
twist the ends together.
