Interment will be made at the Rural Cemetery.

St. John Team to Bowl

Coughlan will bowl at the Palace Bowling Alleys Friday night against a team of five representing the alleys which will be selected tonight. Play will begin at 8.30. Derrick off at Nerepis

Following the accident to the big derrick of the Quebec Bridge Company, which toppled off the track near the Nerepis bridge on Tuesday, the company borrowed one from the C. P. R. in order to effect temporary repairs and to the dismay of the contractors and the government engineers, this too was put out of action by going off the track. Temporary repairs will be proceeded with as far as possible in order that the construction work may not be interfered with. The engineers of the Quebec Bridge Company have wired their head office at Walkerville Ont., explaining the situation, and it is expected that hoisting gear of the strongest type will be on the scene as soon as possible, and the work will be proceeded with.

LIGHTNING BURNED BARN AT ZIONVILLE

HORSE KILLED IN THE BUILDING AT SAME TIME

Storm Same as That Which Did Much Damage Here—Tree at Barker's Point Struck.

A report from the Nashuaak is to the effect that the thunder storm which was so severe in this section of York County, Tuesday, caused the destruction of a barn in the vicinity of Zionville, the property of a farmer named Albright. Lightning struck the building and set fire to it. Of two horses kept in the barn one was killed but the other was removed safely by the occupants of the farm. The loss is heavy.

Tree Struck at Barker's Point

At Barker's Point near the home of Manford Yeomans a tree was struck by lightning and splintered, pieces being thrown to considerable distances. No other damage was done in that section.

Fatality in Northumberland County

The only fatality reported as a result of the storm was at Eel River Bridge, Hardwick, Northumberland County, where Mrs. Alex. Jenkins while sitting in the kitchen of her home was killed instantly by a bolt which struck the house. At the time she had a little child upon her knee who miraculously escaped death.

Death of Returned Soldier

Corp. Willard Robb, Canadian Medical Corps, died at the military hospital last night from disease contracted during fifteen months' service overseas. The deceased was aged twenty-five years and was a native of Moncton, his father being the late Harry Robb of that city. He enlisted at St. John in the 16th Field Ambulance Unit. He is survived by his mother and one brother Kenneth of St. John. Mrs. Robb who is a resident of St. John came here some days ago. The deceased soldier was operated upon three times while in England and arrived in Canada June 14th after being invalided. After remaining at his home in St. John for a short time he entered the Convalescent Home at Fredericton. The funeral took place this afternoon with military honors. Service was conducted by Rev. G. M. Young and interment was made at the Rural Cemetery, in the McNally lot his mother being formerly Miss McNally of this city. The deceased was a member of the Queen's Square Methodist Church, St. John.

New Bank Notes

The Canadian Bank of Commerce is putting into circulation five and ten dollar notes of a new issue, which are being paid out on the fiftieth anniversary of the date on which the President, Sir Edmund Walker, joined the staff of the bank. The designs of the new notes are entirely different from any now in circulation and present a most attractive appearance. They have been designed and engraved especially for the bank and the designs are copyrighted. There is very little coloring on the face of the notes. In the five, the white space on each side of the central figures is taken up by a design in color, that on the right containing the caduceus and that on the left the seal of the bank. In the ten a panel of multi-color work containing the seal of the bank occupies the centre of the note. The back of the five is in olive green and that of the ten in blue, the designs on the back being the same in each case, except for the numerals representing the denomination.
