## DEADLY SECRET OF THE MYSTERY SHIP REVEALED

Thrilling Story of a Battle With a German  
Submarine Told by Sir Eric Geddes--  
How a British Decoy Ship Put One  
Over on a U-Boat--The Fight Was  
Kept Up for Five Hours

The First Lord of the Admiralty speaking at a concert to the American sailors and soldiers at the Palace Theatre, London, told a thrilling story of a British mystery ship which he called "Q" 50.

"Q" ships, he said are decoys. They may be an old sailing vessel, lumping along in a choppy sea, obviously unarmed and an easy prey to submarines. In half-a-dozen seconds or so she is converted from an apparently harmless trader to a formidable man-of-war.

She was a dingy looking collier, steaming at eight knots at about 11 o'clock in the morning far out at sea. She had a little gun mounted in her stern. The morning was grey and the waves white-flecked on the ocean. A submarine was sighted two points on the starboard bow. She fired a shell at the "Q" 50, who immediately turned away as if to escape, feebly returning the submarine's fire with her little gun. The submarine came on, keen for her destruction. "Q" 50 eased down to seven knots, then to six knots all the time firing intentionally short with her little gun, and the submarine overhauling fast, and every now and again hitting the poor, frightened cargo steamer.

A wireless message flashed out in plain English: "Submarine chasing and shelling me, submarine overtaking me abandoning ship," and the message read by the submarine crew convinced them that they had an easy prey.

An hour and a half had passed and "Q" 50 was pretty badly knocked about.

Wounded and dead lay on her decks. A panic party went over the side in full view of the submarine, with all signs of fear and haste. What an undisciplined lot. One man carried with him a cage containing a parrot.

### The Captain's Strategy

I will now read in the captain's own words what happened.

A shell went through the poop, exploding a depth charge and blowing my gunnery lieutenant out of his control. Two more shells followed in the poop, and the enemy then ceased fire and closed.

In the meantime the poop was on fire, and clouds of dense black smoke issued and partially hid the submarine from view. It was obvious to me that the magazine in the poop must soon explode, so I had the option of opening fire on an indistinct object with a minimum chance of success or waiting until it got on the weather side.

I waited. At 12.53, when the submarine was passing close to my stern a large explosion took place. The gun and gun's crew complete were blown in the air.

The gun landed forward on the well deck and the crew in various places, one man in the water. Projectiles were also blown about the ship.

This was indeed a misfortune, as the submarine had only to steam another 200 yards and I should have had three guns bearing at 400 yards range.

The panic party had left the ship leaving on board the captain and a limited number of picked men in hiding until the submarine came close to finish this helpless prey.

The fire in the magazine was raging and mark you, all the time these men manning the gun knew that the moment was coming when they would be blown into the air, but in order not to disclose the fact that they were in the ship they waited for the explosion.

The explosion came before the submarine could be dealt its death blow,

and when the gun and her naval crew were hurled through the air the submarine saw that he had met at last the "Q" ship the German submarine commanders dread.

The submarine had been hit two or three times, but not vitally damaged and torpedo after torpedo was fired at "Q" 50. The captain then gave the order "Abandon ship" and an additional party of naval men this time were sent away on a raft, but the captain and an officer or two, and the picked guns crew still remained hidden.

For another hour the submarine suspiciously circled round "Q" 50, and the British warships, in obedience to wireless signals, stood off.

The submarine then came on, and when she got forward of the "Q" 50, in a flash the forward gun was unmuzzled. Shell after shell was discharged. One took away the enemy conning-tower. Another hit her broadside, and the submarine went down.

The fight added Sir Eric, lasted from 11 a. m. to 4 p. m. The warships lying away behind the horizon hurried up, and picked up the crew of the "Q" 50. The enemy now knew of this old ruse, and there was no need of further secrecy, said the First Lord, but he and Admiral Simms had more ways than one of trapping submarines.

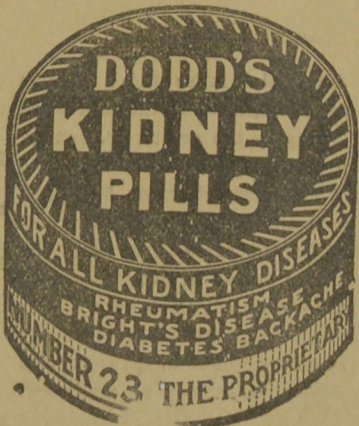
## WHAT HE DID TO THE SHEEP
