CANADA'S GOOD WORK FOR THE WOUNDED SOLDIERS

Boston Man Tells of a Visit to Convalescent Homes in This Country---Returned Soldiers Fighting the Good Fight to Usefulness in Civil Life

The story of heroes, working hard to get well, that is the story told by Dr. M. E. Champion, of the State Board of Health, who has recently returned from a visit to Canada.

The story of strong men, toiling, setting their teeth, agonizing in effort to make the maimed hand resume its cunning—that is part of the story, which Dr. Champion can tell.

"Of course, officially I visited Canada to look into the matter of public health. But nobody can be in Canada for an hour, without the desire to know what Canada is doing for her sons returned.

"At Hart House, Toronto, you may look upon the work." For Hart House

besides being a "novel gymnasium," is the place where the 'never say give up boys' learn again the lore of the spirit unafraid the gospel of the high heart.

"They come here from the hospitals, these crippled soldiers; the man who cannot grasp anything; the man more than a little discouraged; the farmer who never is likely to farm any more. And they face the future—here—with the most efficient of reconstruction nurses, and a psychologist who understands that all is not well with a man, ever after his body is cured."

The story continued. A story of 20 years old, brave to make sport of his tedious journey back to the clever use of limbs paralyzed or artificial. The story of nurses who refused to pity, but had plenty of time to cheer up. But back to the "novel gymnasium."

"As you enter Hart House you are not impressed with the leg-stretching, grasp-clutching, body-straightening machinery. That is minimized, kept in the background. For the soldiers fighting the good fight to usefulness in civilian life must not become introspective. But all manner of sights you see. There is the man who drops everything he touches. For months this has been so. He has made up his mind that he will never hold anything again. Therefore he is humored to the extent of a glove-like apparatus which buttons over so that the fingers are made to hold. Then the man is put to playing tennis, the racket firmly fixed in his hand. It does not take such a long while before he has forgotten that his hand doesn't hold, and his gloves unbuttoned, is manipulating his racket as well as anybody."

On the discipline of this reconstruction house Dr. Champion had a word to say. "They are military; the exercises are compulsory; for it is better to give the soldier these in his uniform, while still he is receiving army pay. It emphasizes their importance. For, as the psychologist in charge explains as we will learn, when we come to the problem of our reconstruction, the change from army life to civilian life is troublous. Since, for four years these soldiers have had their thinking done for them. They have lived in the open, lives of no responsibility beyond orders. Now, again, they must guide their own lives, assume their own responsibilities, do their own thinking. That is why all reconstruction work for soldiers must, as at Hart House, in Canada, be mental and spiritual quite as much as physical."

Which is the story of what, in part, Canada is doing for her soldiers. Which will be our own story, and our own problem shortly. Till finally, as in Canada, the soldier is discharged cured, or as cured as his affliction can be cured. He is then sent on to the vocational school where he is paid a small wage while learning. One axiom Dr. Champion brought back with him and here it is:—

"These men who have seen life in the throes, and measured up values in the intense moments, as living hung dubious in the balance, will not be shackled down to the slavish occupations, when they return. They have lived in the open for four years; they have felt its great urge. They will come back to work in the open. The war, at its close, will usher in a period of reconstruction in life work, or reclaiming the land, that had never even been dreamed of, except for the vigils men have kept in the poppled fields of Flanders."

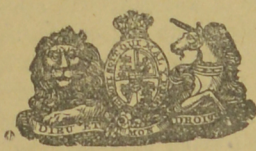

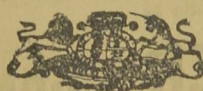
