JUDGEMENTS IN THE DIVORCE COURT TODAY

DECREES GRANTED IN
FOUR OUT OF FIVE CASES

Fifth Case Remains for Further
Evidence—Two Divorces
Absolute, Two a Mensa
et Thoro.

Judgements were given this morning by His Honor Judge Crocket of the Court of Divorce and Matrimonial Causes. Two decrees of divorce a mensa et thoro were granted and two decrees of absolute divorce. In a fifth case His Honor granted no decree leaving the case open for the presentation at the November sitting if so desired by the plaintiff, of evidence to corroborate that of the sole witness produced to prove infidelity.

Cunningham vs. Cunningham

In the case of Eleanor Louise Cunningham vs. William Henry Cunningham a decree of divorce a mensa et thoro was handed down with costs. The order which the plaintiff had obtained for alimony is to stand. This case was from Lorneville, St. John County. The grounds alleged were cruelty and desertion. Reviewing the evidence His Honor stated that though the plaintiff had condoned the first offense there was no doubt that his subsequent actions had proved guilt of the defendant.

Mallory vs. Mallory

In the case of John Mallory vs. Alberta Best Mallory, a case from Kings County, several acts of adultery were alleged but only one witness was produced to prove the infidelity. His Honor said that he would not say that the testimony offered was insufficient to prove the offense but several other witnesses might have been produced. On this account he refused to grant a divorce but would not dismiss the libel but would allow the case to stand to give the plaintiff an opportunity to produce corroborative evidence.

Gormley vs. Gormley

In the case of Mary Louise Gormley vs. William Gormley the principals in which reside in St. John divorce a mensa et thoro with costs was granted on the ground of cruelty, the evidence being considered sufficient. In this case the defendant appeared in person in court but did not go upon the stand.

Hatheway vs. Hatheway

In the case of Maria Hatheway vs. Rainsford Hatheway His Honor said that there was no doubt of adultery. There had been no doubt concerning the proof of marriage but he considered the evidence produced sufficient. A divorce with costs was granted. In this case which was from Victoria County the defendant was sentenced

FURNITURE FACTORY HAS BEEN PROPOSED

DELEGATION BEFORE
THE CITY COUNCIL

Usual Exemptions and Bonus
of \$10,000 Asked—Council
will Further Consider Matter.

The City Council was approached last night by a delegation of well known business men who are supporting a proposition to establish a furniture factory in New Brunswick. The delegation was composed of Messrs W. G. Clark and Howard Rogers of Fredericton and Stanley Douglass of Stanley. The Council was asked for concessions for the proposed industry in the form of a free site, tax exemption for a period of ten years, free water and a bonus of \$10,000. All members of the delegation were heard. The Council asked that the delegation place its proposals in writing when consideration would be given them. In response to questions by the aldermen members of the delegation said that it was proposed to erect a factory which with equipment would cost \$60,000 and which would employ seventy five operatives with an annual pay roll of about \$50,000.

In Support of Proposition

Mr. Rogers in placing the proposition before the council drew attention to the fact that there is no furniture factory in New Brunswick although hardwood is abundant. He believed such an industry in Fredericton would be a success. There were men behind the proposition would give it financial support.

Hetherington vs. Hetherington

In the case of George Hetherington vs. Priscilla Hetherington His Honor reviewed the evidence at great length and granted divorce, dowry being barred. The court said that as far as the counter charges against the plaintiff were concerned he did not think that the evidence was sufficient to show any wrong doing on the part of the plaintiff. The principals to this case resided in the Parish of Grand Falls, Victoria County.

Application Refused

The applications for the transfer of the hearing in the cases of Logan vs. Logan and Burton vs. Burton to St. John were refused the court holding that grounds were not sufficient. The cases stand for the November sittings. The case of Allen vs. Allen was struck off the docket.

Court adjourned sine die.

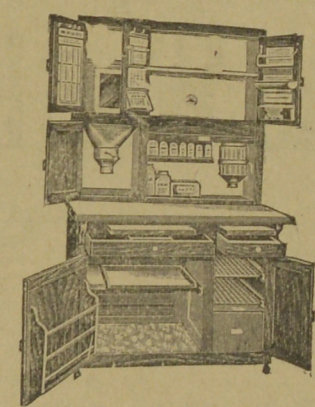
