

ST. PAUL'S CHURCH ANNEX NEARING COMPLETION

Finest Building of Its Kind in Eastern Canada--Grant & Horne of St. John, Contractors, Expect to Hand Over Building Before End of the Month--Bequest of Late Donald Fraser--Description.

The annex of St. Paul's Presbyterian church which was bequeathed to the congregation by the late Donald Fraser of this city, is nearing completion and probably will be handed over by the builders before the end of the month. The building which is to be devoted to the Sunday School and various church organizations, is the finest building of its kind in eastern Canada. When the congregation of St. Paul's formally takes possession there will be a fitting observation of the occasion. The building will be a permanent memorial to one of New Brunswick's foremost business men and one of the staunchest

members of St. Paul's church. Mr. Archibald Fraser of this city, son of the deceased and an executor of his will, has taken a keen interest in the erection of the building.

Handsome Edifice.

The edifice adds much to the appearance of a handsome church. Its main front is on York street. The material is Ashlar limestone from the Brookville quarries near St. John, trimmed with gray freestone, the same materials which were used in the construction of the church. The style is similar to that of the original building and harmonizes well with it. Large windows with leaded glass of amber tint like that in the windows of the church and wood panels in the centre are prominent features of the front. Although the front is of impressive appearance the greater part of the work on the building is inside and must be seen to be properly appreciated.

General Plan of the Annex.

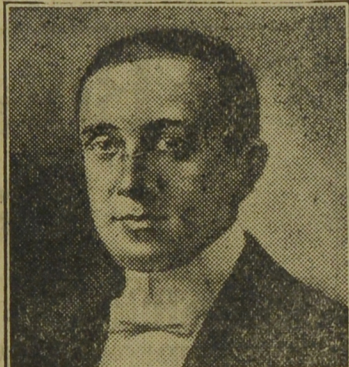
The annex has a frontage of seventy-four feet on York street and is ninety-three feet in depth. It is three stories in height with a basement in addition. Concrete was used in the foundations. The roof is flat. It was erected so as to partially surround the church, being built against the rear of the older structure and part on the eastern side. From it access to the church is obtained from the basement and also from the first floor, the latter means of communication leading into the choir loft. The main entrances are two in number and are from York street, one at each corner. There also is a side entrance from George street and an entrance to the basement from the same street.

The Basement.

The basement contains twenty-five different departments. One is a kitchen which when completed will be equipped with a steam table. At the rear is the gymnasium with a clear floor space forty-nine feet, seven

inches by thirty-seven feet. Accommodation for spectators is furnished and is separated from the arena by a metal grille. Access to this is through an ante-room which is equipped as a box office. The gymnasium is so arranged that it can be used as a dining room. Near it is the boiler room which is equipped with a Jenkins self-feeding boiler which will heat both church and annex. This room also has an ash hoist. Hot and cold shower baths and several toilets also are located in the basement.

The First Floor.

The first floor which is entered from the street has as its principal feature an assembly hall sixty by forty feet and two stories in height. From the main floor ten stalls or class rooms open. All stalls on the main floor and in the gallery which composes the second floor will be in full view of the superintendent's desk on the stage which is at the front of the hall. The stalls are separated from one another by folding doors by the use of which the class rooms can be made any size desired. A stage of a size sufficient for any church entertainment or meeting is at the front of the hall. This stage has two ante-rooms. In addition to the assembly hall there are on this floor the library, the minister's room, a ladies' parlor with kitchenette in connection, two front halls, one rear hall, a beginners' room, three stairways to the basement and three to the gallery. The doors of the various parts of the first floor are so arranged that practically the entire floor can be thrown into the assembly hall. Folding doors, sliding doors and horizontal roll doors in addition to swinging doors are used. In the assembly hall the folding doors number forty-eight and in the stalls thirty-five. There also are thirty-six swinging doors leading to the hallways.

Second Floor.

The second floor comprises the gallery which overlooks the assembly hall. It contains twelve stalls, a choir room, a senior class room and an adult class room. It is equipped with forty-eight folding doors, ten swinging doors leading to the hallways and seventeen sliding doors. The third floor comprises several rooms which as yet have received no designation and which will be used as required.

Minor Details.

Throughout the building is finished in natural wood. The electric lighting equipment is modern in every particular. This part of the building is not yet completed but will be in the course of a few days. A diffuser for the ceiling of the assembly hall will be one of the unusual features. The building was erected from American plans. Advanced notices stated that there was to be a swimming pool but such was not provided for by the plans.

St. John Contractors.

Grant & Horne of St. John, are the contractors who have erected the building. Work was begun in May last. Owing to the scarcity of labor and freight congestion on the railways the contract has taken longer than it would have otherwise. Following their usual policy Grant & Horne have employed local labor wherever it was possible. The freestone used in the building was cut on the ground. The heating apparatus was installed
