WIRELESS PLANT SEIZED IN A BROADWAY BUILDING

Machine was Powerful Enough to Flash Messages Across the Atlantic--Seizure was Made by United States Secret Service Official--Man in charge was Formerly Manager of the Sayville Plant--Claimed He was Doing Experimental work.

New York, Mar. 4. — Wireless apparatus sufficiently powerful to communicate with Germany, which was in the possession of Richard Pfund, at one time manager of the German Telefunken plants at Sayville, N. Y., and Tuckerton, N. J., was seized yesterday by federal officials. It became known today. The outfit was found in a room in the tower of the office building at 111 Broadway. While it was disconnected it could have been set up in half an hour, experts declared.

The raid was made by United States Marshal McCarthy, an army intelligence officer, an army wireless expert and other government agents. They were refused admission by Pfund, who occupies the four floors of the tower as a laboratory. He took the stand that he was doing experimental work for the navy and that they had no right to interfere. He unlocked the door, however, when the officers threatened to break it down.

Pfund is said to have made an explanation concerning the presence of the apparatus in his laboratory, but the nature of it has not been disclosed. He was not taken into custody although it is understood the inquiry has not been completed. His assertion that he had been doing work for the

navy was verified, but no announcement was made as to its nature.

He is said to have shown the officers the model of a field wireless outfit for communication between points on the battlefield.

Owners of the building said that prior to 1913 Pfund was manager of the German wireless company and that the corporation was the tenant of the tower. It failed to renew the lease in 1913, however, and Pfund took over the four floors which he used as an experimental laboratory. They said he had wires strung on two structures of ironwork on the roof which he used as antennae, presumably for testing wireless apparatus.

Questioning the superintendent of the building elicited the information that a photographer named Pach sometimes went to the roof of the building to take pictures.

Philadelphia, Pa., Mar. 4. — "We will not be a strictly free people until ten thousand German propagandists in this state have been hanged to telegraph poles and shot full of holes."

This statement was made today by Howard Heinz, federal food administrator for Pennsylvania, at a luncheon of food officials.

Mr. Heinz has just returned from a state-wide speaking tour. He reports that the activities of German agents have been making serious inroads on food conversation.

These German agents have been spreading stories that the Allies are eating white bread and that there is a surplus of wheat in Argentina.

"With our present tonnage we cannot conveniently get the wheat from Argentina to our Allies because of the long haul. It will be next year before we can even catch up with the present sinkings of the U-boats."
