Death at Nashwaaksis

The death occurred yesterday at his home in Nashwaaksis of Charles Kenneth Seymour aged fourteen. The deceased has been ill for a short time with influenza and succumbed to that disease. He is survived by his parents Mr. and Mrs. Frederick Seymour. The funeral took place from the late home this afternoon at 3.30 o'clock. Rev. Mr. Fisher conducted the service, interment being made at St. John's Churchyard.

Died at Dorchester

Ex-Sheriff Joseph A. McQueen of Dorchester, at one time a member of the Legislature for Westmorland died on Saturday after a lengthy illness. He was prominent in fraternal societies and was for some time Regent of the Royal Arcanum. His only son Mr. William A. McQueen, died of pneumonia on Nov. 1st. One brother Dr. C. A. McQueen and one sister Mrs. D. C. Allen reside at Amherst. The late Mr. McQueen was elected to the Legislature at a by-election in 1891, along with Mr. H. A. Powell, defeating Mr. I. T. Stevens and Mr. A. E. Killam.

SGT. G. MACHUM IS REPORTED AS SHELL GASSED

**PRIVATE FRED H. JONES
IS A SIMILAR CASUALTY**

Both Soldiers Have Seen Long Service in France—Casualties Occurred Early This Month.

Although the peace armistice was signed on November 11th the casualties are still coming in. Several local casualties are reported today. Both resulted from a gas attack and both of the young men have had several miraculous escapes from death.

Sergt. George Machum

Mr. John T. Machum of North Devon received official notice today that his son Sergeant George Machum was admitted to a Casualty Clearing Station on November 7th to recover from the effects of shell gas. A cablegram arrived shortly afterward from London signed "Machum" saying that he was gassed very slightly. Sergt. Machum enlisted and left for overseas with the 64th Maritime Provinces Battalion. He was for some time with the 12th Canadian Machine Gun Section but when that broke up at the beginning of the big push about three months ago he was transferred to the 4th Division. Sergeant Machum passed successfully through the battles of Somme, Vimy Ridge, Paschendaele, Lens and the big drive of a short while ago. On September 27th he had a very narrow escape. He was then with the Machine Gun section and was waiting the word to fire, when the bushes in which he was concealed were riddled and a bullet struck his belt and lodged in some photographs he had in his pocket. The photographs were torn to pieces and have been sent home as souvenirs. Several interesting letters have been received by his parents telling of his narrow escapes.

A brother Sergt. Lee Machum is at present in France. He was wounded by gunshot in the left jaw September 4th but only a flesh wound was inflicted. He returned to duty some time ago.

Private Frederick H. Jones

Mrs. P. P. Jones of this city received news today that her son Private Fred H. Jones was admitted to No. 23 Casualty Clearing Station on November 6th suffering from shell gas. Private Jones left here with the 104th Battalion and was transferred to the 5th Canadian Mounted Rifles. He has been in France now about two years. He came through the battles of Paschendaele, the Somme, Lens and Vimy Ridge successfully but was buried by a shell explosion on November 5th, 1917. Two other brothers are in Khaki Private Willis who left here with the 65th Field Battery about a year ago and Private Archie who is returned.

**LADIES' COMMITTEES
APPOINTED LAST NIGHT**

"Movie" Theatre at Military Hospital Nearing Completion—Entertainment for Troops.

A meeting was held yesterday afternoon in the Normal School Building for the purpose of organizing a ladies' committee to assist in carrying on the work of the Red Triangle Club during the coming winter. The Returned Soldiers' Aid, I. O. O. E., Red Cross, King's Daughters, Women's Institutes and various church organizations of this city were well represented. The meeting was called by T. A. MacDonald, Military Y. M. C. A. Secretary.

Mr. MacDonald who is a returned soldier and has been stationed at Camp Sussex is a well known York County man. He was studying law at the time of enlistment and on his return took up Y. M. C. A. work. He explained the work to be gone over and asked that the committee of ladies be appointed to prepare and arrange the entertainment of men who will be stationed here this winter.

To Open This Week

The rooms over John Gibson & Sons store were given for the club room and already have been decorated. The last of the week will see the opening of the club rooms for the soldiers. The rooms will be open every day from 4 p. m. till 10 p. m. The Y. M. C. A. will conduct a canteen for refreshments such as soft drinks, ice cream, etc. A piano and pool tables are being obtained for the amusement of the soldiers. Each society will have a week at a time to entertain the troops.

Moving Pictures

In regard to the entertainments the new auditorium at the Military Hospital has been equipped with a moving picture machine and shows will be given once a week for the benefit of the soldiers. Five ladies of this city have been placed on the Executive for the arrangements. They are Mrs. Arthur M. Gibson, Mrs. Charles McGibbon, Mrs. Harry Walker, Mrs. Arthur R. Slipp and Mrs. Miller. The various societies will consult these ladies as to the arrangements to be made.

There was a Red Triangle Club in every city but our own and there is no reason why it was not started long ago by the authorities here. The work will be under the direction of the Military Y. M. C. A. The citizens of Fredericton are asked to give their co-operation in carrying on the work.
