WANTS HOUSE TO ACCEPT
THE MAN POWER POLICYLloyd George Tells House of Commons
That It Must Either Pass It or Put in
Another Government--Proposals Meet
With Much Criticism---Mr. Asquith's
Attitude.

London, April 10.—Factors which governed the recent crisis over the removal of General Sir William Robertson as chief of the general staff still seem to control the political situation. Lloyd George has again charged the House of Commons to accept the government's man power policy or put another government in.

Since no parliamentary session appears ready to take the government responsibility the indications are, as shown by today's debate on the second reading of the bill, that the government will carry the day, despite clear evidence that the new proposals meet with the most widespread criticism. Moreover, the news from the front today showing the continued gravity of the military situation, is helping the ministers in their new campaign.

Opinion in the lobby of the House was that former premier Asquith could have taken a much stronger attitude against the government than he did, and the fact that he refrained from utilizing the opportunity to embarrass the government is indicative of the spirit of a large section of the House.

Dillon's Attitude.

Ireland and the attitude of the nationalists, of course, remains an unknown factor, but John Dillon, at the end of his speech made to indicate a possible means of agreeing with the government. Until the government proposals on the projected Home Rule measure becomes known, nothing can be predicted with any degree of certainty.

After a somewhat exciting sitting today the government carried the second reading of the manpower bill by the unexpected majority of 223. It is not likely, however, that the bill may be modified considerably in its passage through Committee.

Andrew Bonar Law government leader intimated decision of the debate that the government might consider putting the conscription age at forty eight instead of fifty.

London, April 10.—After Sir Charles Hobhouse former post master general and Donald MacLean had criticized the bill, expressing the opinion that the number of men over forty who were fit for service did not justify raising the age limit, John Dillon, the Nationalist leader, said that, apart altogether from Ireland, no cause had been made out for the bill itself. As to the Irish proposal, they would destroy the hope of an Irish settlement during the war.

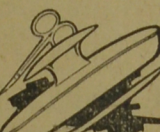

Challenged the government to take a plebiscite in Ireland, and declared that antrim would vote with Clare against conscription. The farmers of Ulster, he said, were against conscription. Sir Edward Carson, interrupting said:

"No more than the farmers of England". The estimate of 400,000 men from Ireland, continued Dillon, was not right. Two years ago the figure was put at 120,000, and since then twenty thousand had volunteered. He believed that no more than 80,000 could be obtained without doing infinitely more injury by destroying the food supply.

Predicts Trouble

The real purpose of the bill was to divert public attention and inquiry from the true causes of the failure on the western front. The attempt to extend the bill to Ireland would open up another war front in Ireland, all the more formidable because it would be a moral front, in which Great Britain would be wrong; it would be a front which whatever form the conflict took, would spread to America and Australia and to all the corners of the earth where the Irish race was scattered.

Mr. Law's Views

Andrew Bonar Law spokesman for the government said that what had happened in France was unexpected. That was why this bill was presented. "It is useless to conceal from ourselves the real position," he said. "Until the battle began the balance of forces was not against the Allies on the western front. Not only the government, but the British and French military advisors believed that there was nothing of anything fatal happening. Wherever the fault lies it does not relieve the necessity of filling the ranks in the army unless we are here prepared to accept the position that we cannot win."

"We have been able to fill the wastage in the battle thus far, but according to the figures of the casualties available, the most critical time is likely to arise at the end of May and June. We have succeeded to some extent in meeting the difficulty by what the Americans have done. We cannot put too high our admiration of President Wilson's action in this matter in brigading the American troops. Nothing but a absolute necessity could have justified our making such a demand and President Wilsons acceding to it."

There were still eight months at least of this campaign left Mr. Bonar Law continued and if the struggle went on, as the government believed it would, the men conscripted now would become available just at the time they were needed. The government had already put in men of four months or less training, and must face the economic risk, confronted as it was by a greater risk.

"What we are doing now," he said, "might mean the difference between victory and defeat."

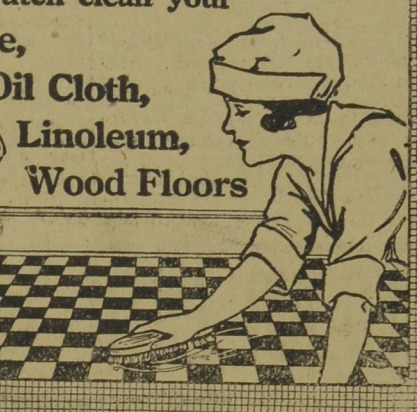
