RUBBER GLOVES A GODSEND.

So Useful and So Apparently Plenti-
ful and Inexpensive—But They
May Not Always Be.

Thanks to the 5-and-10 cent stores
the use of rubber gloves has become
universal among women who do their
own housework. But because they can
now be bought for so small a sum, the
care of rubber gloves is a thing almost
unknown. "Wh bother?" is asked,
"when rubber gloves are worn out we
can always get a new glove for 10c.
or a pair for 20c. Use them up and
get new ones."

Yet, rubber is growing more and
more precious and scarce. And for
every pair spoiled before its full ser-
vice has been given, for lack of intelli-
gent care, the housekeeper expects a
dealer to provide her with a new pair
for 20 cents.

How long will they be able to? It is
time for economy in this especial item
to be looked on as important.

Most Useful in Hospitals.

Let those who doubt it drop in at
one of the surgical dressing headquar-
ters and ask, casually, if they can use
rubber gloves! Today the very life of
the surgeon operating back of the bat-
tle line may depend on his ability to
protect his own hands from infection
while operating, with a thing as slight
and insignificant as a 20 cent pair of
rubber gloves!

If the buyer of rubber gloves, each
time she goes to make the purchase,
would invest in two pairs—and give
the second one outright to the Red
Cross or surgical dressings committee
she would soon find herself willing to
help conserve this most important fac-
tor in surgery.

How to be Careful.

How? By being careful when they
are on the hands and taking the same
precautions to avoid tearing them that
she would to prevent a cut on her
hands.

Don't catch them on sharp points or
edges. Never get them greasy; grease
or oil is the one thing that seems to
rot them. Try putting a drop of oil
on a rubber band and leave it for a
time if you need to be convinced.

Have the gloves clean and dry be-
fore putting them away, dusting them
inside and out with talcum. This will
keep the surfaces from sticking to-
gether. A tear in one can often be re-
paired with adhesive plaster. And,
first and last, be careful. It pays.

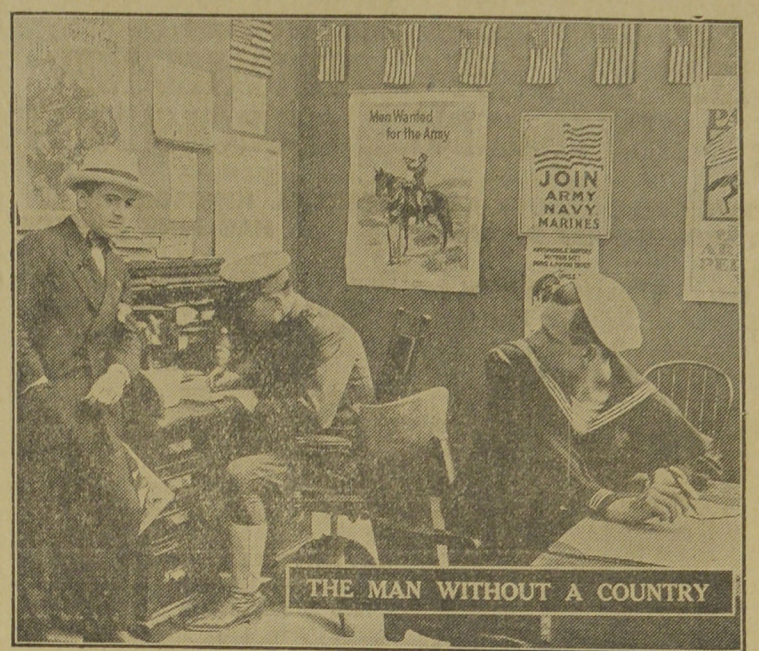
