

## C. P. R. EXPRESS INJURED A BOY THIS MORNING

**J. MYSHRALL STRUCK AND  
THROWN SOME DISTANCE**

**Taken to Victoria Hospital but  
Extent of Injuries Not Yet  
Known—Son of Joseph  
H. Myshrall.**

The incoming train on the Fredericton Branch of the C. P. R. this morning struck Jerry Myshrall the young son of Joseph H. Myshrall night porter at the Barker House and injured him severely. The boy was taken to the Victoria Hospital but up to this afternoon the extent of his injuries was not known. The back of the boy's head was much cut but it is not thought the skull is fractured as the lad was able to walk after the accident although not aware of what was going on about him. The index finger was cut off his left hand.

### Where Trains Crossed

The accident occurred near Queen's Square where the train for Minto and the incoming express crossed and transferred mail. The boy's father was in his garden on Maryland Road the boy having left him and gone toward the railway. He heard his son call out that the dog had gone under the train but paid little attention to the remark. A few minutes later he was told that the train had struck the lad. The latter is hard of hearing and it is supposed that he did not hear the express approaching. He was thrown some distance. Dr. Wainwright attended him.

### The Hay Crop

Details of the death of the late Lieut. Earle Scovil formerly of the 236th MacLean Highlanders and well known in Fredericton have been cabled to his father John W. Scovil of St. Stephen. The cable says that whilst Lieut. Scovil was flying his engine became stalled at a height insufficient for him to resume control of his machine.

### Was Asleep in the Grass

The police station received a hurried call Saturday night for a little girl residing in Needham street who was believed to be lost. The child was only three or four years old and her relatives were anxious. Before the police could organize for a search however there was a second telephone call to tell them that the child was not lost but had fallen asleep in the tall grass in the yard at her home.

### Looking For Men

British Columbia people are in St. John searching for lumbermen to work in the Pacific province. The securing of spruce for airplane parts has grown into such a flourishing industry in British Columbia and the fame of New Brunswick lumbermen having spread to that province these parties, through their agents, are endeavoring to secure men to go to British Columbia to take part in this work.

### Their Wages Increased

The operators in the N. B. Telephone Company have received a substantial increase in wages. The minimum salary has been raised and the increase arranged so that the pay envelope grows larger each three months, until the maximum of forty dollars a month is received. In addition to this the company pays a bonus for long service, beginning at the end of the first year and increasing each year.

### Given Doctor's Degree

At the last commencement of the University of Pennsylvania the degree of Doctor of Philosophy was conferred upon twenty-four candidates. Among those receiving this honorable distinction was Rev. P. R. Hayward, of Toronto, recently pastor of the Fairville Baptist Church. The subject of the thesis presented was "Compensation for Injuries to Canadian Workmen." Dr. Hayward is on the staff of the National Council, Y. M. C. A. He and his wife are members of Englington Baptist Church, Toronto. Rev. Dr. Hayward is a graduate of the University of New Brunswick and is well known in Fredericton.

### Interfering with Drift-Wood

A number of men who have made the practice for years past, of picking drift-wood along the shore near the city pumping-station, are loud in their complaints that bathers who patronize the bathing beach in that vicinity interfere with the piles of drift-wood and set much of it afloat, to the loss of the owners who collected it at much trouble. This practice should be stopped and it is probable that a complaint will be made to the police concerning it. Children in search of pieces of wood on which to support themselves in the water are the chief offenders but many old enough to know better also take the wood and let it go adrift in the river.

## METHODISTS DEDICATED NEW CHURCH SUNDAY

**CENTRAL KINGSCLEAR  
HAS FINE EDIFICE**

**Rev. G. M. Young of This City,  
Conference President, De-  
livered the Dedictory  
Sermon.**

The Methodist congregation of Central Kingsclear yesterday dedicated the new church which recently was built on a lot donated by Charles Kilburn of that place. The clergymen taking part in the services during the day were Rev. G. M. Young, of Fredericton president of the New Brunswick & Prince Edward Island Methodist Conference, Rev. A. D. McLeod of Devon on whose circuit the new church is, Rev. Mr. Steeves, Baptist pastor of Macnaquac and Rev. Mr. Thompson, Congregational pastor of Keswick Ridge. The dedictory sermon was preached by Rev. Mr. Young. Large congregations attended all three services. Half of the new edifice was built of timber and other material taken from the old church which had been used by the congregation for seventy-four years. The old structure was situated some three miles above the new church which is one of the finest church edifices in any rural community in this section of the province.

### Many in Attendance

Many from Fredericton and other neighboring places attended the services during the day. The homes of the people of Kingsclear not only of the Methodist denomination but also of the Baptist and Anglican bodies, were opened to the visitors, much to the satisfaction of the Methodists of the community who greatly appreciate the helpful spirit of those of other denominations.

### Three Services

At the first service at 11 a. m. Rev. A. D. McLeod was the preacher. The dedictory service began at 3 p. m., the sermon being preached by Rev. Mr. Young, Rev. Mr. Steeves and Rev. Mr. McLeod assisting in the service. The edifice was duly dedicated according to the discipline of the Methodist Church. The large congregation occupied the church and part of the grounds about it. At 7 p. m. there was another service at which Rev. Mr. Thompson was the preacher, Rev. Mr. McLeod assisting in the service. An offering of ninety dollars was given at the services, being greater than had been anticipated.

### The New Church

The new church replaces that which did duty for seventy-four years and which was torn down last autumn, and is practically finished, the painting of the exterior and some work on the foundations alone remaining undone. Particular attention was de-

## LABOR BUREAUS TO BE OPENED IN EACH COUNTY

**EFFORT TO SOLVE THE  
HARVEST LABOR PROBLEM**

**Dept. of Agriculture Acts in the  
Matter — Tractor Demon-  
strations to be Given  
in September.**

Hon. J. F. Tweeddale, Provincial Minister of Agriculture, announced this morning that the Department would establish at an early date labor bureaus in the various counties for the purpose of making an effort to meet the demands for laborers to harvest the crops of New Brunswick. The details of the scheme will be made known to the public by means of press advertisements.

### Registration of Farmers

Farmers will be registered by the bureaus together with the labor requirements of each and efforts will be made to distribute the laborers according to the demands from the various farms. If the suggested system does not work out satisfactorily the Federal authorities will be asked by the Provincial Department of Agriculture to consider the problem as it is of the utmost importance that the New Brunswick crops be harvested. The grain crop of the province now gives great promise.

### Tractor Demonstrations

The Department of Agriculture also announce that arrangements have been made for a tractor demonstration at various points in the province during the month of September. A number of firms manufacturing tractors have been asked to compete at the demonstrations and already five have consented. Others are expected to do the same. The demonstrations will take place on the first and second Tuesdays and Fridays of the month. They will take place at Florenceville, Fredericton, Sussex and Bathurst in the order named. At Sussex the demonstration will be on the farm of W. S. Holman formerly the property of S. J. Goodliffe.

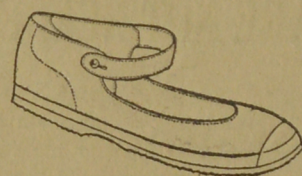
