LET EVERY ONE DO SOMETHING

A great responsibility rests upon
each one with a plot of land at his
disposal of helping in the titanic
struggle. Everyone can help. It is
the individual effort that counts.

There's not a pair of legs so thin,
there's not a head so thick,
There's not a hand so weak and white,
nor yet a heart so sick,
But it can find some needful job that's
—crying to be done,
For the glory of the garden glorifieth
every one.

The home garden offers a special
opportunity for women. Their mobil-
ization is a war necessity. It is true
that women are not so strong as men,
but they do not need to be, in order
to cultivate a garden. And it has
been proven that in endurance of hard-
ships and fatigue woman is man's
equal.

See that the soil is suitable for cul-
tivation and do not take on more than
you can successfully look after. A lot
25 feet by 100 feet will furnish an
abundance of fresh vegetables for an
average family, and this is all any
one person otherwise employed is phy-
sically capable of working. Plant this
in standard vegetables—the fewer the
better—such as potatoes, beans, peas,
carrots, beets, parsnips, lettuce and
onions.

What and When to Plant.

I do not advise the planting of tur-
nips or corn in small plots. Even po-
tatoes require considerable space, but
they are so essentially the "blue rib-
bon" vegetable that a garden seems
incomplete without them. Unless you
are a professional gardener, don't
waste time on fancy vegetables such
as asparagus or strawberries, or even
tomatoes or celery. There is little
nutrition in them at best, and while
occupying valuable space, require a
lot of time and labor.

Amsterdam, April 22.—The streams
of wounded Germans from France and
Flanders, says the frontier correspond-
ent of the Telegraaf, continue so great
that all the hospitals, monasteries,
convents and schools, not only in Brus-
sels, but in many towns south of the
Belgian capital, are filled to overflow-
ing. The Germans have even requisit-
ioned private houses for hospitals.

Forty ambulance trains entered the
north station at Brussels daily last
week. Many of them were made up
of cattle cars in which there were
litters of straw for the wounded men.
