FIGHTING STILL CONTINUES ALONG THE PIAVE RIVER

Nearly Ten Thousand Prisoners Taken by the Allies, Besides Guns and Ammunition--Looks as If the Austrians Cannot Avoid a Defeat--Text of the Italian Official Statement

Paris June 20—The splendid resistance of the Italians and their Franco-British allies leads the French press to conclude that the Austrians cannot avoid defeat, especially as well directed counter-attacks have resulted in the capture of many prisoners and much war material. A Havas despatch from Rome says that Italy has achieved a great double victory, referring to the recent naval exploit in the Adriatic and the present checking of the Austrians.

Late in March, says the Echo de Paris, field Marshal von Hindenburg demanded that Austrian divisions be sent to France, field marshal Conrad von Hotzendorff, supported by Emperor Charles, assured the German leader that an Austrian offensive against Italy would have a great chance of success and would be received joyfully by the dual monarchies. This point of view was finally accepted by the German supreme command.

Many Prisoners Taken

Rome, June 19—The Italians have captured since the beginning of the Austro-Hungarian offensive on the Italian front prisoners to the number of 9,011, and taken many guns and several hundred machine guns, the Italian war office announced today.

The battle on the Piave River broke out again furiously yesterday afternoon, the statement adds. Fresh efforts of the invaders to cross to the right bank from San Andres to Cadelu were repulsed.

An intense struggle also took place in the Fossalta sector, north of Capo Sile.

The text of the Italian statement follows: "On the night of June 17-18 and in the course of yesterday the enemy did not renew his attack from the Asiago Plateau to the Montello. His partial actions were completely repulsed in the Grappa and Montello region.

"We carried out thrusts in the Asiago Plateau, the allied detachments capturing many score of prisoners and two guns.

"With unceasing pressure we shortened the front opened by the enemy south of the Monte Belluno railway. Our artillery with deadly concentration of fire did not give truce to the enemy masses waiting along the front of the battle or in movement in the back areas.

"Yesterday morning was calmer on the Piave River but in the afternoon the battle again broke out furiously.

"New attempts made by the enemy to cross to the right bank from San Andres to Cadelu were repulsed. On the embankments of the river between Cadelu and Fossalta and the strenuous defence of our troops tried the enemy sorely and his impetus was broken by our infantry.

"Equally intense was the struggle which raged in the sector of Fossalta south west of Meola and north of Caplo Sile.

"Every yard of ground was the theatre of epic struggles, in which our own and allied airplanes took part, bombarding with 15,000 kilograms of bombs and firing tens of thousands of machine guns, rounds into the vulnerable targets offered by the enemy troops forced into the narrow space on the right bank of the river.

"The battle is continuing bitterly. The enemy in order to preserve some of the initial advantages gained by him takes no heed of the immense losses which our rifle fire and the guns of our airmen have been inflicting the past five days.

"Prisoners taken since the beginning of the battle amount to 9,011. Austrian machine guns remain in our hands.

"The number of enemy airplanes brought down now amounts to fifty. Two of our own or allied machines are missing."

Virtually No Progress

London, June 19—The Austrians have been able to make virtually no progress against the British force holding an important section of the

line on the Italian front.

The situation on the Italian front is unchanged, according to the official communication tonight describing these operations. The statement says: "There has been heavy fighting on the Piave front but the enemy made little if any progress today. The river is in flood and many of the enemy's bridges have been washed away.

"The situation on the British front is unchanged. Two additional mountain guns have been captured."
