

COLLISION BLOCKS F'TON & GRAND LAKE RY.

HEAD-ON SMASH CAUSED BY MISTAKE IN ORDERS

Freight and Construction Train Met Yesterday Afternoon—Crews Jumped—Clearing the Line.

The Fredericton & Grand Lake Railway was blocked yesterday as the result of a head-on collision between a freight train and a construction train at a point some thirteen miles from Fredericton. Up to an early hour this afternoon the line was not cleared and no train had gone out from this city or arrived here.

No Particulars

The office of the Fredericton & Grand Lake Railway in this city stated this morning that on account of the distance of the scene of the accident from the telephone line which is operated in connection with the railway, details of the wreck and of the progress made in clearing the line could not be obtained.

Result of Wrong Orders

It is reported that the smash was the result of wrong orders from the crossing of the two trains, and that the two train crews jumped before the accident occurred. Damage to locomotives and rolling stock is said to be extensive. As far as is reported there was no serious injury to any person. An auxiliary train went to the scene last night.

Moving to Sydney

The plant of J. H. Corbett & Sons, Inc., contractors, which has been stored at Oromocto and other points since their contract on the St. John and Quebec Railway was completed is being shipped to Sydney, N. S. where the Company have an important contract.

Capt. Porter Transferred

Capt. (Rev.) F. S. Porter, C.E.F., has been transferred to the First Canadian Division Ammunition Column. This will mean but little change in his duties. The unit with which he is now associated is composed largely of Ontario and Western men. Chaplain Porter has enjoyed good health throughout his period of active service and has met with no mishaps though a letter from a soldier at the front tells of his coolness under shell fire. He is a Fredericton man.

New Lumber Company

The Royal Gazette contains notice of the incorporation under provincial charter of Gerrity-Mann Lumber Co., Limited, with head office at St. Stephen and capital stock of \$24,000. Those incorporated are James F. Gerrity of Bangor, Joe Warren Gerrity of Boston, Charlie N. Vroom of St. Stephen and J. Milton Mann of Calais. The company is empowered to take over as a going concern the business of the voluntary partnership known as the Gerrity-Mann Lumber Company and to engage in a general lumbering and pulp business.

Frost Damage Extensive

The damage by frost Tuesday night was quite general over the central and northern sections of New Brunswick. In York County there was heavy loss by damage to beans, potatoes and similar crops. It is believed that in some sections these crops although considerably set back will recover. In other sections there must be replanting. The frost had a chance to do extensive damage on account of the advanced condition of vegetation due to the favorable spring. Many persons feared another frost last night but it did not occur in this section.

CLAIMS HE IS OVER DRAFT AGE OF THE M. S. A.

FRIENDS OF HUDLIN MAKE STATEMENT

Dom. Police Claimed They Were Fired Upon When After Him—Friends Say Officers Fired.

The Mail is informed by a resident of Sunbury County that the man Hudlin after whom the Dominion Police were several weeks ago claims to be over the draft age of the Military Service Act. It also is stated that he has two younger brothers in the United States Army having enlisted at Bangor, Me. The Dominion Police after their return from the home of Hudlin stated in this city that they had been fired upon while trying to find the man.

Say Police Fired

Hudlin's friends say that there were no shots fired at the police but that the latter fired several revolver shots at Hudlin while he was running for the woods. They also state that the man's house was forcibly entered by officers during his absence.

Lived in Boston

The man who was wanted by the police under the Military Service Act returned from Boston some three years ago and since that time has followed the occupation of trapper, hunter and fisherman.

Many attended the tea given last evening by the Ashburnham Branch Red Cross Society, in honor of the fifty seventh birthday of Field Marshal Sir Douglas Haig. The grounds of the residence of The Earl and Countess of Ashburnham, Brunswick Street, were beautifully decorated with lights, hundreds of electric light bulbs, both colored and plain, being used in the decoration scheme. During the evening a concert was played by the Fredericton Brass Band and there was dancing on the lawn. An excellent tea was served by members of the Branch. The proceeds amounted to \$285.10 with more to be added from the sale of dolls which will be about twenty dollars. The wiring will be left in place for a strawberry festival which by request will be held in July.

ADDITIONAL CHARGES HAVE BEEN MADE

MYSHRALL MUST FACE SEVERAL THFT CHARGES

Chief Finley Yesterday Recovered Goods Said to Have Been Stolen from Various People.

Additional charges of theft have been made against Ephraim Myshrall of Kingsclear, arrested at his home on Friday last on a charge of stealing goods from the Canadian Government Railways. At that time articles alleged to be stolen from the railway were recovered from his home and information was secured that many other articles which appeared to have been stolen from other parties were in the house. Within the past two or three days the owners of property discovered in the house have identified goods as theirs and information of several charges of theft has been laid.

Police Again Visit Place

Yesterday Chief Finley of the Fredericton Police went to Kingsclear and took from the house goods which had been identified. Much of the property belonged to the owners of summer camps in the vicinity of Myshrall's home and had been taken from the camps by the accused as far as is known. A quantity of soft beer in cases claimed by a resident of Springhill also was taken. Two salmon nets the property of a neighbor who fishes in the river also were recovered.

Appeared to Have Mania

It appears that Myshrall had a mania for stealing any articles which he could lay his hands on. Much of the goods which he took he does not seem to have made use of. He was remanded on Saturday last until the 24th, when his case will be heard in the police court.




