

TURNING POINT IN EPIDEMIC NOT YET REACHED

SEVENTH DEATH FROM DISEASE IN THIS CITY

Allen W. Bearisto Died This Morning and Mrs. John Burgoyne Yesterday Afternoon.

Secretary George Y. Dibblee of the Fredericton Board of Health stated today that there were indications that Fredericton was holding its own in the number of cases of influenza occurring in this city. He believes that the number of new cases is balanced by the number of those convalescent. The total number of cases reported so far is 275.

Seventh Death From Pneumonia
The seventh death from pneumonia during the influenza epidemic occurred this morning when Allen W. Bearisto passed away. The death of Mrs. John Burgoyne at the Waverly Hotel Sunday afternoon was the sixth since the beginning of the outbreak. Three of the deaths were at the military hospital. The latter institution reports ten cases at present of which two are pneumonia cases. All are now convalescent.

Visiting Nurses' Good Work
Miss Kate Stewart who was appointed visiting nurse for Fredericton last week has done some excellent work among the families in which all members are ill. A motor car has been placed at her disposal and she has covered much ground. If possible another nurse will be appointed.

In Neighboring Places
Devon, Barker's Point and Marysville all have numbers of cases of influenza. Some entire families are reported to be down with the disease. The Department of Public Health is now receiving reports from the various parishes of the province. From places in this section the reports are as follows:

Prince William parish, York county, no cases, no deaths; one case of grippe.
Parish of Bright, York county, fifty to sixty cases, three pneumonia, no deaths.

Southampton, York county, six cases, one pneumonia.

Marysville, York county, 25 cases.

Devon, York County, 45 cases.

False Alarm Sunday
The Fredericton firemen were called out yesterday afternoon to answer a call from box 52. On arriving they found it to be a false alarm.

A Big List
No less than thirty deaths of residents of this province are chronicled in today's Daily Telegraph, the majority of the deaths appear to have been due to pneumonia.

Condition is Improved
The condition of Capt. C.W. Bennett paymaster of the District Depot is improving after a severe attack of influenza. He is still in his bed but is expected to be convalescent shortly.

Returned From Providence, R. I.
Miss Maude Gilbert of Devon has returned from Providence, R. I., where she was engaged in nursing at one of the hospitals. Miss Gilbert was through the influenza epidemic and herself had an attack of the disease.

Visit is Postponed
Word was received Saturday that the visit of Dr. J. W. Robertson of Ottawa in connection with Food Control organization has been postponed indefinitely on account of the influenza epidemic.

Shot Fine Moose
Mr. Charles Talcott of New York arrived in the city on Saturday after spending some time on a hunting trip up the Tobique. Mr. Talcott went in with Charles Cremin and succeeded in getting a fine moose.

Death at Hospital
Mrs. Maria Owens of Tay Settlement died at the Victoria Hospital last evening after a lingering illness. The deceased was twenty-six years of age and is survived by her husband Mr. L. Owens of Tay Settlement. The remains will be forwarded to Tay Settlement for interment.

Gazetted a Lieutenant
Another Fredericton boy has received a commission for service in France. He is Lieut. William J. Lawson, son of Mr. and Mrs. A. C. M. Lawson of this city. Lieut. Lawson enlisted in the 23rd Field Battery while attending the U. N. B. He enlisted with a number of his classmates of the university and proceeded overseas. In March of this year he left France for England to qualify for his commission. He was gazetted a Lieut. in July and proceeded to France on September 13th.

Death at Barker's Point
Alfred Rickard, son of Mr. and Mrs. William C. E. Rickard passed away at Barker's Point last evening after a lingering illness of pneumonia. The deceased was nineteen years of age and is survived by his parents and several brothers and sisters. The funeral will take place this afternoon at 4:30 o'clock. Service will be conducted at the house by Rev. H. H. Ferguson. Interment will be made at Sunny Bank Cemetery. This is the third death in this house in a few weeks. The entire family is down with influenza.

MORE LOCAL MEN REPORTED AS CASUALTIES AS RESULT OF THE RECENT VERY HEAVY FIGHTING

Private George Harris, Who Enlisted in Boston with the 236th MacLean Highlanders, Killed in Action, and His Nephew, Private Fred W. Harris, is Gassed—Flight Lieut. G. Walter Kitchen Had Wrist Fractured When His Machine Fell—Corp. Frank Baxter Wounded—Gunner G. A. Boyd is Also Reported Wounded.

Over the week-end a number of Fredericton soldiers have been reported in the casualty list. Corp. Frank Baxter a member of the original 26th New Brunswick Battalion is reported wounded. Another of the 236th MacLean Highlanders Private Fred Harris is gassed. Gunner Gordon A. Boyd who crossed last winter with a draft from the 9th Siege Battery is wounded. The latest report from Private Stanley Young is not as encouraging as the reports last week. Flight Lieut. G. Walter Kitchen reported last week as a casualty, has a fractured wrist. Private William Harris of the 236th is reported killed in action.

Corp. Frank Baxter
Mrs. Annie Baxter received a telegram yesterday which stated that her son Corp. Frank Baxter was admitted to Fort Pitt Military Hospital, Chatham on October 1st suffering from gunshot wounds in the left leg. Corp. Baxter left with the original 26th Battalion and has seen long service in France. He has one brother Gunner Harry Baxter at present in Witley Camp. One brother-in-law Sergeant Major Maiman is with the 58th Field Battery. Another brother Walter is returned after service with the 26th.

Wrist Fractured
Mr. and Mrs. Alfonso B. Kitchen have received a cablegram from their son Lieut. Walter Kitchen. He stated that he had the control of his machine shot away and had a fall having his wrist fractured in the crash. Mr. and Mrs. Kitchen are very thankful that no serious injuries have been received by him.

Private Stanley Young
Mr. and Mrs. Chas. D. Young of Westmorland Street have received a cablegram stating that their son Private Stanley Young has been moved to Pavilion and York Place Military Hospital, Brighton, England. The condition of Private Young seemed to have been changed by his being moved. His condition before was improving but now is not so favorable.

Killed in Action
The name of K. McLaskey of Fredericton appears in the casualty list as killed in action with the infantry.

Gunner G. A. Boyd
Mr. and Mrs. Alexander Boyd of George Street received a telegram yesterday which stated that Gunner

Gordon A. Boyd was admitted to No. 7 Canadian General Hospital at Letreport on October 11th suffering from gunshot wounds in the left leg. Gunner Boyd left with the 9th Siege Battery last December and has been in France since June 1st.

Private F. W. Harris
Mrs. George Harris received a telegram today stating that her son Private Frederick W. Harris was gassed on October 14th and admitted to No. 3 General Hospital Letreport. Private Harris enlisted with the pipe band of the 236th Highlanders and went overseas with that unit.

Private William Harris Killed
Mr. George Harris of this city was notified on Saturday that his brother Private William Harris was killed in action in France on September 29th. Private Harris enlisted in Boston with the 236th MacLean Highlanders but was transferred to another kilted unit. He is survived by his mother, two sisters, and two brothers, George of Fredericton and Jack of St. John. The deceased soldier was an uncle of Private Fred W. Harris reported gassed.

Private J. Murray Sears
Private J. Murray Sears, son of Mr. John Sears of Barker's Point was reported in Hospital on Saturday with wounds and gas burns. Private Sears went overseas with the 236th Battalion and was later transferred to a Highland Battalion in France. He was a well known athlete around Fredericton. He played hockey for the Fredericton High School team of 1915 and 1916 and played for some time with the city team where he got the nickname "Flossie" by which he was well known here.

Died This Morning
The death occurred this morning of Allen W. Bearisto from pneumonia. The deceased was twenty-eight years of age and is survived by a wife and two children, Jack and Mary. He is also survived by five sisters, Myrtle, Janie and Katie, Mrs. Chas. Clarke of this city and Mrs. George Brown of Boston and by three brothers, Frank overseas, Frederick and Melvin. Mr. Johnson Bearisto, father of the deceased also survives. The funeral will take place tomorrow morning at ten o'clock with interment at the Rural Cemetery. There will be an open air service.
