## FOOD PRICES STILL GOING UP

Ottawa, July 17.-A continuance of the upward tendency in the cost of living is shown by the labor committee's report on food prices for month of June. The average cost of a family budget of staple foods in some sixty cities the middle of June was \$12.77, as compared with \$12.66 for May, \$11.-89 for June, 1917, and \$7.35 for June 1914. In prices the advance in meats, coal, wood, oil and eggs continued, but there were declines in butter, milk and potatoes.
