OF INTEREST TO WOMEN

A SALAD OR TWO.

Cucumber Salad.

Peel 6 large cucumbers and chop
fine, add tablespoonful of salt and let
stand two hours. Drain dry and add a
teaspoon of pepper and 2 small on-
ions chopped fine. Stir in a pint of
good cider vinegar and put up in fruit
jars. No cooking needed. Put in wide
mouth bottles with corks sealed with
wax or paraffine.

Cauliflower Salad.

Place cauliflower head down in cold
salted water and let it stand for one
hour to draw out all dirt, cook it in
boiling water salted, head up, from
30 to 60 minutes. When tender, sepa-
rate the flowerlets, cool, marinate with
one measure of French dressing and
place on ice to chill. Arrange in a
bowl with crisp lettuce leaves. Serve
with French mayonnaise dressing.

HOUSEHOLD HINTS.

Dry salt will remove stain on silver
caused by eggs.

To clean iron sinks, rub with cloth
wet with kerosene oil.

To clean zinc, mix together lime and
water to the consistency of a thick
cream. This will not only clean, but
brighten it.

Badly discolored brass should first
be washed in hot soapsuds, to which
a little washing soda has been added,
and then scoured with paraffin and
whiting. If afterward polished with
brass paste in the usual way a beauti-
ful lustre will be the result.

To keep the nickel on your stove
shining, wipe the nickel with a wet
cloth while hot and shine with a wool-
len cloth.

Before putting away spare silver,
clean it thoroughly; wrap it up in dark
blue paper with a few camphor balls
in the parcel, and even when the sil-
ver is unwrapped, even months after-
wards, it will be found to be as bright
as when placed away. Filigree orna-
ments should always be kept in dark
blue soft paper.

WAR CANNING BULLETIN.

Don't Let Them Escape.

The canning season will not be over
until every empty jar is filled and
tightly sealed. So don't let any es-
cape you.

It must be kept in mind that the
success of your canning depends very
largely on the condition of your jars.
They must be sterilized for at least 15
minutes. Everything must be clean
and airtight. The rubbers and tops
must be faultless. It is economy to
buy new rubbers every year. Other-
wise you are apt to find your fruit fer-
menting before the first snowflakes
fly.

Write to any of the provincial com-
mittees or direct to the Canada Food
Board for a five-cent booklet on the
canning, drying and storing of vege-
tables. It will give you process in de-
tail, and in canning as in everything
else, prevention is better than cure.

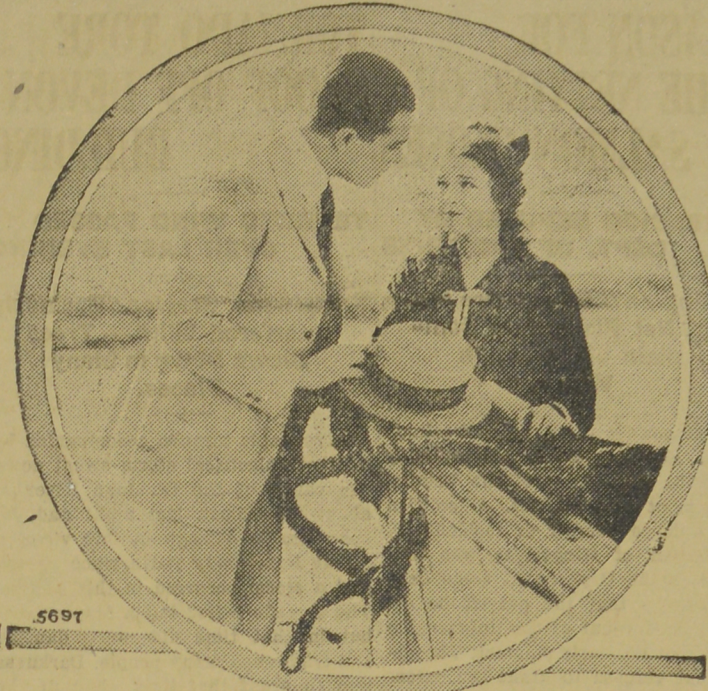
ONE ON THE HUN CENSORS

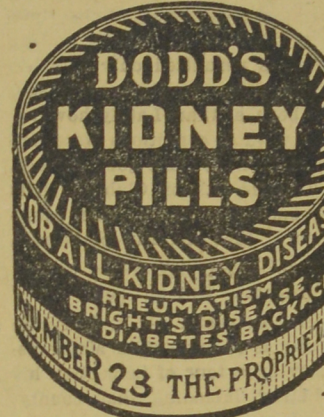
