BRUTALITY OF HUN PIRATES

Turk's Island, B. W. I., Nov. 4, via
Halifax, Nov. 5.—Reporting the capture
of their ship in lat. 37.30, long
53.30 by a German submarine on Oc-
tober 13th, the captain and seven men
of the Norwegian bark Stifinder, New
York to Freemantle, arrived here last

night in a pitiable condition, follow-
ing their 21 days' exposure in an open
boat with little or no food. A second
boat containing the remaining eleven
members of the crew became separated
from the captain's boat a few days
after the sinking, and were taken to
New York by a submarine chaser.

The captain states that when he
and his crew were abandoned to their
fate by the U-boat they first tried to
reach Halifax, but their boat capsized

and with it went the bulk of their pro-
visions. They managed to right the
boat and after 21 days of intense suf-
fering were finally able to make this
island.

MAGISTRATE DEFINES POWERS OF INSPECTORS

Interesting Case in St. John—
Right of Liquor Inspector
to Search Person was
Questioned.

(St. John Globe, Monday)

The Police Magistrate this after-
noon imposed a fine of \$80 on Harry
Quinn, accused of interfering with
Liquor Inspector Robt. McAlinsh in the
discharge of his duty but sentence
was suspended. The facts of the
case were disclosed when Quinn was
arrested about two weeks ago. Quinn
and a man named McCarthy were sus-
pected of having liquor in their pos-
session and were searched by the In-
spector in an alley off Peter St. The
question in the case was, had the in-
spector the right to search. In his
judgment the Magistrate said:

"Inspectors are peace officers, clothed
with adequate powers for prevent-
ing and detecting violations of the
Prohibition Act. Inspectors can enter
and search barns and other places for
liquor, may demand the name and ad-
dress of any individual under certain
circumstances, and on his refusal may
apprehend him. The officers have power
to examine, open and search any
package, having reasonable ground to
suspect a violation of the prohibitory
act law. The inspectors may also
search "pockets," automobiles or other
vehicles for liquor.

"Whether citizens are in favor of,
or opposed to, the Prohibitory Act,
whilst it is on the Statute Book it
must be observed. It is a dangerous
doctrine to put forward the idea that
Canadians must only obey an act, the
provisions of which meet with their
approval. Until the law be repealed
it must be observed. Inspectors and
policemen are sworn to carry out its
every provision. Let them do their
duty and the courts will do the rest.

"Indisputably the law governing
such cases is plain and not open to
argument. The old government
passed the Prohibitory Act and the
Foster Government is carrying it out.
We must not forget that without
ample, drastic power be given the In-
spector and policemen it would be
difficult, if not impossible to detect
violations of such an enactment as
the Prohibitory Law. Inspectors and
policemen must be protected more
particularly during war time and under
war legislation.
