# DIVORCE COURT WILL SIT FRIDAY MORNING

**Further Evidence Required in the Case of Burton vs. Burton — Applications Filed in Two Fredericton Cases — The Suit of Mallory vs. Mallory Has Been Completed.**

The New Brunswick Court of Divorce and Matrimonial Causes adjourned Tuesday afternoon until Friday at 11 a. m. when hearing will take place in the case of Charles Howe vs. Annie May Howe.

The suit of Louise Theresa Piers vs. George Herbert Piers was allowed to stand for the present.

The suit of John Mallory vs. Alberta Best Mallory was proceeded with. In this undefended action in which Kenneth A. Wilson filed record evidence was presented at a previous sitting of the court but His Honor Judge Crockett decided that he wanted further corroborative evidence on the question of adultery. Yesterday afternoon a witness named Vickford was placed upon the stand who gave evidence which satisfied His Honor that there had been infidelity on the part of the defendant.

In the suit of Annie Gertrude Burton vs. James Burton, J. H. F. Teed appeared for the plaintiff. This case came over from a previous sitting. Three witnesses were called. R. W. L. Tibbits, Deputy Provincial Secretary, gave evidence relative to the right of the clergyman who officiated at the marriage of the parties concerned to solemnize marriages. The

plaintiff herself and William Edmundson also went on the stand and gave evidence relative to acts of infidelity on the part of the defendant. His Honor stated at the conclusion of the evidence that he desired further corroborative evidence with regard to alleged unfaithfulness and permitted the case to remain open until such evidence may be presented.

In the suit of Louise Logan vs. Robert A. Logan the Registrar H. G.

Fenety stated that no instructions concerning the action had been received and the case was struck from the docket, counsel not being prepared to proceed.

## Fitz Randolph Case

The suit of Charles FitzRandolph vs. Elizabeth FitzRandolph a Fredericton case which was tried at previous sittings of the court and in which the decision for divorce was reversed and new trial ordered on appeal to the Supreme Court of New Brunswick, will be heard at a later date an appeal on behalf of the defendant now pending in the Supreme Court. Yesterday A. J. Gregory K. C. counsel for the plaintiff asked the court that the case be not stood over until next term but that a date be named to avoid unnecessary expense to his client. He also moved to amend his original libel so as to set forth two new charges of infidelity against the defendant, with Frank Worrell at the Fredericton Golf Clubhouse and at the defendant's residence in Fredericton, and with Matthew Butler in the years 1915, 1916 and 1917 at Montreal, and New York City. R. B. Hanson, K. C., on behalf of J. B. M. Baxter K. C. counsel for the defence, argued that any postponement

should be until the next term of the court to give the defendant opportunity to meet the new charges.

In this action which attracted much attention when tried before the Divorce Court, application was recently made by Mr. Baxter before His Honor Judge Crockett for a trial by jury which the court refused on the ground of unconstitutionality. An appeal from this decision of Judge Crockett's is to be made to the full bench of the Supreme Court on behalf of the defence.

## McManiman Case

In the suit of Bessie Irene McManiman vs. Stephen Basil McManiman, another Fredericton case F. H. Peters for the plaintiff made application for suit money and also a motion to stand the case over until the next term on account of the illness of the plaintiff now a resident of Marysville and an operative in the Canadian Colored Cottons mill in that town. The affidavit presented by counsel was found to be defective in the fact that at the time action was brought both parties were residing in the State of Massachusetts consequently being outside the jurisdiction of the New Brunswick Divorce Court. Opportunity was given counsel to amend the affidavit and to

make the applications at a later date. The docket is as follows.

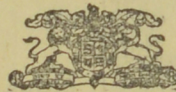
