Austria politically is going to pieces. at work organizing a government, and comes that the Germans have thrown have taken over all the national services within their boundaries. Dr. Masaryk, the intellectual and political head of the race, is resident in the United States, and has from this distant point of vantage been directing matters. Perhaps the most romantic incident connected with the whole matter was the formal reading and adoption of a Declaration of Independence in the old and venerable Independence Hall in Philadelphia, where the American Declaration was drawn up and adopted by the revolting colonies. It is not such an elaborate document as that of Jefferson, but it nevertheless sounds the right note. The national platform runs as follows:

"The Czecho-Slovak State shall be a Republic. In constant endeavor for progress it will guarantee complete freedom of conscience, religion, science, literature and art, speech, the press and the right of assembly and petition. The churches shall be separated from the State. Our democracy shall rest on universal suffrage; women shall be placed on an equal footing with men politically, socially and culturally. The rights of the minority shall be safeguarded by proportional representation; national minorities shall enjoy equal rights. The government shall be parliamentary in form and shall recognize the principles of initiative and referendum. The standing army will be replaced by a militia. The large estates will be redeemed for habit of chumming around with an home colonization and patents of nobility will be abolished."
