Continuing the speaker said that it was one thing to show a balance of cash on hand or a surplus at the end of the year, but it was an entirely different thing to show a revenue balance on the right side after all liabilities incurred during the year had been paid.

In this connection he wished to say that while announcing to the House the financial results of the year, he wished to place certain facts clearly before hon. members and the public. He then read the following statement: Increase in bonded debt:

Increased the Debt.

HON. MR. MURRAY continuing said that some years ago, when he last had the honor of occupying a seat in the House, he had listened to an hon. member opposite discuss the financial position of the province. That hon. member had pounded his desk in agony over the public debt of the province and tears had flowed down his alabaster cheek, yet when that hon. member had got into power he was able to increase the debt to the extent of \$9,224,525.17 in eight years and there was little to show for it. To be sure there had been a quid pro quo but it was for the good old party and not for the province. Referring to the subject of Permanent Bridges, the minister said he would crave the indulgence of the House by presenting the following statement:

Permanent Bridges, 1917, \$428,679.66

Amount spent previous to 1st April, 1917 by old govt. ... \$174,446.48

Amount paid since 1st April on contracts of old govt. ... 213,585.46

Total amount chargeable to old govt. ... \$388,031.94

Special road expenditure 1916 and 1917 amounting to \$82,787.15 was entirely spent previous to April, 1917, under old government.

Permanent road expenditure \$334,066.65, made up as follows—

HON. MR. MURRAY continuing said that although \$388,031.94 of the amount expended for permanent bridges was chargeable to the old government, the opposition press is holding the present administration responsible for it.

MR. SMITH (Carleton)—"That is not so."

HON. MR. MURRAY—"I have the paper in my pocket which says so."

Some hon. members—"Read it, read it."

HON. MR. MURRAY continuing said that the road machinery had been purchased by the old government and he did not care to say much about it. The road machinery purchased by the present administration had cost \$12,331.07.

The Interest Charge.

MR. SMITH (Carleton)—"You had better say less about that."

HON. MR. MURRAY—I don't have to say anything about it, only that it was all right. Continuing he said that the item of interest for 1917 amounted to \$441,184.14, made up as follows: Interest on bonds and registered stock, \$378,846.21; interest on Southamptown Railway bonds, \$6,208.97; Woodstock Cold Storage bonds, \$600; interest on cash deposit, \$1,350; interest on deposits and sinking funds \$1,486.14; discounts and bank charges, \$538.14; interest on crown land sinking funds, \$52,156.68. The interest on overdrafts at banks totalled \$2,912.52, while interest on credit balances amounted to \$1,918.30, making the net amount \$994.22.

Sinking Funds.

Dealing with the question of sinking funds he said that the total on October 31st, 1916, was \$560,622.48, while on October 31st, 1917, it was \$1,030,887.89, an increase during the year of \$470,265.41. The amount of \$427,433.78, which has been accumulating since 1913, and which should have been invested in a Crown Land Sinking Fund, was so invested by the government during the last fiscal year. In addition to this the sum of \$52,156.68 in interest was paid out of current revenue to the Crown Land Sinking Fund. As a result of the Price, Waterhouse & Company's audit, an additional sum of \$1,645.80 was paid over to the farm settlement sinking fund to make good a shortage for the year 1916. A bond issue of \$38,500 for New Brunswick Settlement Lands fell due last year and the sum of \$15,360.37 was paid out of its own sinking fund and the balance of \$23,139.63 was taken from the Crown Land Sinking Fund.

The Permanent Road Bond Issue of \$400,000 would run for a period of nineteen years with interest at the rate of 4 per cent and would be repayable in annual installments. It had been sold to the Crown Land Sinking Fund at par and would be liquidated out of the motor vehicle sinking fund established in November last. He held that the policy of borrowing money from time to time, and making no provision for repayment was unsound and not favorably regarded by the money market. Provision of an annual sinking fund should be made for every bond issue at the earliest possible moment and when made should be lived up to and he could assure hon. members that that would be the policy of the present administration. During the past year bonds held in London to the amount of \$49,790.86 had been redeemed and replaced by a bond issue of \$38,500, making a gain of \$9,833.74. Had the old government refunded the sterling debt and Valley Railway bonds, as it might have done, they could have made in the vicinity of nearly \$1,000,000 by the transaction. They had failed to take advantage of the situation and when the present administration came into power, the United States had entered the war and the money market was closed to foreign securities. Had the old government taken some action, it might have rendered a service that would have been welcomed by the Imperial government.

The total proceeds of bond sale during 1917 had been \$857,500. The discount on the same was \$21,490, making the net proceeds \$836,010.

The expenses in connection with the classification of Crown Lands in 1917 amounted to \$30,663.16 and were paid out of the Crown Land Sinking Fund.

The Crisis is with us—the Time of Sowing is at hand—the Responsibility upon New Brunswick is great.

PLANS—

SUGGESTIONS

- (1) Arrange definitely crop rotations.
- (2) Secure seed early.
- (3) Where possible arrange to co-operate with neighbors in the seeding season. Change work.
- (4) Prepare to remain on farm every day after seeding commences, until the seed is sown. Transact all necessary business now.

EQUIPMENT—

- (1) Carefully overhaul all harness.
- (2) Put all machines and implements into shape.
- (3) Procure the most needed repairs; secure a few extra.
- (4) Have all tools, such as axes, saws, hammers and wrenches, ready and conveniently placed.

SEED—

- (1) Reclean seed unless it is satisfactory.
- (2) Treat Oats for smut. Add 4 pint Formalin to 36 gallons of water. One gallon of this mixture will treat about two bushels of grain.
- (3) Treat potatoes for scab.
- (4) Have seed prepared before Spring operations commence.

FERTILIZERS—

- (1) Procure them early; the supply is very limited.
- (2) Have you used more than necessary in past seasons? Plan to use more green manures.

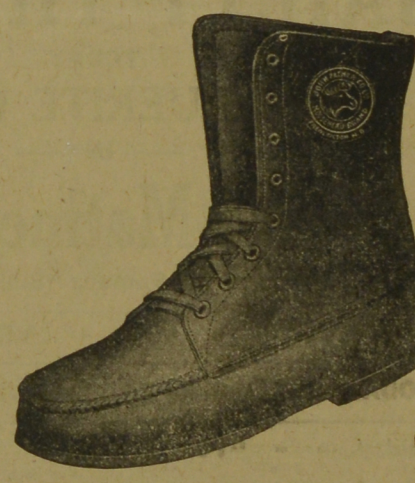
CROPS—

- (1) If your land is suitable for wheat, sow a few acres; if not, arrange in order that some cereal will be grown.
- (2) Food, not dollars, is the great essential—use your land so that your country and also that you may feel the best possible use has been made of every acre.
