

## IMPORTANT RESOLUTIONS ADOPTED BY FARMERS

Branch of Association of United Farmers  
Organized at Sackville---Believed Farms  
Should be Worked to Their Full Capacity  
as a Patriotic Duty --- Experienced  
Farm Hands Should Not be Drafted for  
Military Service

(Sackville Tribune.)

Despite the inclement weather there was a representative body of Sackville farmers present at the special meeting of the local branch of the United Farmers of New Brunswick, held in the Town Hall, Middle Sackville, on Wednesday evening. The president, Mr. Ashley George, was in the chair, and in the absence of the secretary, Mr. Angus M. Avar, acted in that capacity.

The resolution committee, consisting of Messrs. W. B. Fawcett, L. M. Anderson and Angus M. Avar, appointed at the last meeting of the organization to draft a resolution presenting the farmers' case in regard to greater food production, presented the following resolution:

Whereas we have recently organized ourselves as a Branch Association of the United Farmers of New Brunswick, we deem it our first duty and a privilege to publicly re-affirm our loyalty to the British Empire and our determination to do our whole duty in supporting every proper measure taken by our Canadian commonwealth to win the war.

When war was first declared, scores of our farmer sons volunteered for the front, and have nobly fought and never faltered from duty, even to making

the supreme sacrifice in the noble fight of Britain and her Allies for world-wide liberty.

And whereas Canada contains more fertile farm lands and fewer farmers to the acre than any part of the Empire within easy reach of the battlefields;

And whereas our Imperial government and the governments of every one of our European Allies have appealed to Canada repeatedly in the last two years to produce more and more field crops, and to send to their people and our armies every pound of food possible, and thereby prevent an inevitable famine throughout all Europe.

Therefore resolved, that this Association of farmers firmly believes that our first and most patriotic duty is to work our farms to their full capacity by every possible means in order that our armies and our people may be fed.

And whereas Canadian agriculture is not represented in our parliament or in our legislatures in any such numbers or proportion as other interests and professions;

And whereas, farmers as a class do not advertise in the newspapers, their best interests remain very largely neglected, and are often misrepresented by the majority of the Canadian Press.

And whereas under these unfortunate conditions it is impossible for any government or for any staff of officials, civil or military, or for the people of our cities and towns or factories to understand the hardships and the handicaps surrounding Canadian agriculture, or to acquire any adequate knowledge as to the best methods of assisting us farmers in our honest efforts to increase farm production.

And whereas this Association is of the opinion that if our government was fully informed of the utter impossibility of maintaining our present average of farm crops (much less any increase) under the acute shortage of farm labor, that it would not permit another experienced farm hand

## MEN WANTED FOR HOME SERVICE

Partridge Island, St. John, July 5. The Daily Mail, F'ron.

Gentlemen:—This Regiment—the 3rd (N.B.) Regiment, Canadian Garrison Artillery—has been on active service since the beginning of the war, doing garrison duty at Partridge Island, St. John, N. B.

At the present time we need about 20 more gunners, and feel that, if you will kindly give the requirements publicity in your columns, it will result in securing the recruits.

You might point out that the duties embrace Home Service ONLY and therefore we cannot sign on any men who come under the classes called for by overseas units—that is, we cannot take unmarried men, 20-21-22-23-24 years of age, but married men of those ages and all others may enlist.

The pay and allowances are the same as drawn by men of the Overseas Forces.

The man who enlists with us does not commit himself to go overseas, but will sign on for Home Service and do duty at Partridge Island. Each man who does this may relieve another who is fit for France, but who cannot presently be spared from duty here.

The s. s. "Sissiboo" leaves from the foot of Acadia Street, St. John City, daily at 8.10 a.m., 1.00 p.m., and 3.30 p.m.

All that is necessary for the recruit to do is to be examined by a doctor, and forward me the certificate that he is fit for home service. Free transportation will be sent at once.
