ICE CREAM DAYS.

A Magic Word with Children, and it is Good for Them.

Remember when you were a kiddie, the thrill of anticipation that always came at the magic words "Ice cream for dinner today!"

Sometimes the surprise would be peach ice cream, and oh the joy of finding these delicious slices of frozen fruit in the creamy mass. Or perhaps strawberry was the surprise. Remember the delight of bringing up a plump red strawberry—hard and cold—on the tip of your spoon?

But every flavor was your favorite in those days, vanilla, lemon, orange, but perhaps more especially chocolate—so long as it was ice cream.

Today perhaps you have grown more finicky. You demand more than coldness and flavor. Ice cream, to meet your approval, must be rich in quality and fine in texture.

Don't forget, though, that your children today think of ice cream with the same thrill that you had years ago. Give it to them often. It is good for them.

HOUSEHOLD HINTS.

In mixing flour for gravy, use a silver fork and the gravy will never be lumpy.

Keep your spices in glass jars, and a glance will tell you the contents, even if not labeled.

Black and white cotton goods should be soaked in a solution of salt water to prevent the black from running.

Thin brown toasted bread with stewed tomatoes, sprinkled with grated cheese, then browned in the oven, is a savory dish.

Fish will crisp and brown if it is thoroughly dried on both sides, then dipped in fine cornmeal and plunged into boiling fat.

Before using mutton dripping as a shortening, beat with spoonful of baking powder and two teaspoonfuls of lemon juice.

To prevent the juice of berry pie from boiling out, grease the edge of the pie with oleomargarine.

Use for refrigerator dishes wooden or pasteboard plates such as bakers deliver pies upon. They are inexpensive, do not break, and can be bent a little to make more room.
