

YORK HOTEL DAMAGED BY FIRE FRIDAY

HIGH WIND MADE THE BLAZE THREATENING

Fireman Called Out on Two Other Alarms During the Holiday—Damage in Each Case.

Victoria Day kept the Fredericton Fire Department busy three fires causing gong alarms. The most serious of the three fires was that at the York Hotel between ten and eleven o'clock in the morning. The fire got a remarkable start considering the hour and the stiff breeze which was blowing fanned it to threatening proportions. When first observed the blaze was on the roof of the ell from an unknown cause. Before being put out the fire burned a large portion of the roof of the ell off.

Other Fires

Before the York Hotel fire the department was called to Mr. Allan Bearst's house where a blaze on the roof reached considerable proportions and caused much damage. Later in the morning an alarm from box 17 called the firemen to the Beatty property at the corner of Westmorland and King Streets where there was a fire on the roof. Later the firemen were called to the same place by a still alarm.

FREIGHT TRAIN LEFT C.G.R. RAILS AT TAYMOUTH

TRAFFIC RESTORED LATE LAST NIGHT

Seven Cars Loaded with Pulp Wood Derailed—The Track Much Torn Up—Rails Spread.

There was another run-off on the Newcastle-Fredericton subdivision of the Canadian Government Railways late Thursday night and the line was not cleared until last night. Up to that time passengers had to be transferred around the break.

The derailment occurred at Taymouth, seven cars loaded with pulp wood went into the ditch and the track and roadbed was torn up for some distance. An auxiliary train was dispatched to the scene and repairs were made which restored traffic after twenty-four hours.

Mr. R. Z. Walker, Assistant Superintendent was in charge of operations.

Spreading Rails

The run-off it is believed was caused by spreading rails. There have been a considerable number of wrecks of this description on the Newcastle-Fredericton subdivision within the past few months. The traffic over that line has increased beyond the facilities provided both in the matter of roadbed and rolling stock. It is probable that extensive expenditures will have to be made on the line shortly as it was not constructed originally to carry traffic as heavy as that which is coming over and which is steadily increasing.

GRACE CHASE LOST IN WOODS FOR THREE DAYS

SOLDIERS OF C.O.R. DRAFT MADE SUCCESSFUL HUNT

Daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Stanley Chase, of Devon, Lost Her Way Wednesday Afternoon.

Grace Chase aged about seventeen years, daughter of Mr. Stanley Chase butcher of Devon, was found this morning in the woods a short distance out of the town where she had been lost since Wednesday afternoon. She was found by a searching party of fifty men from the detachment of the Central Ontario Regiment quartered at the Exhibition Building. The soldiers searched for about two hours before they found the girl lying in a clump of bushes. She was weak and in a dazed condition. Upon seeing her father she recognized him however.

Became Bewildered

On Wednesday last in company with other members of the family the girl went into a field owned by her father. She was doing needle work and complained that the noise of the other members of the party annoyed her and went a short distance away and sat down. She was not seen again until today. The fancy work she still had with her when found. The girl is unable to give any account of what happened to her but it is thought that she became bewildered after entering the woods a short distance and wandered about in a circle until exhausted. She was without food during the time she was missing. Just before she left the party Wednesday afternoon she complained of having a headache. She was in the habit of sleeping heavily early in the afternoon and it is possible that she fell asleep and did not wake until night when she could not get her bearings.

Needs Medical Attention

As the result of her experience the girl needs medical attention which was summoned as soon as it was learned that she had been found. It is believed that there will be no permanent effects from the exposure. Search parties of relatives were out Thursday and Friday.

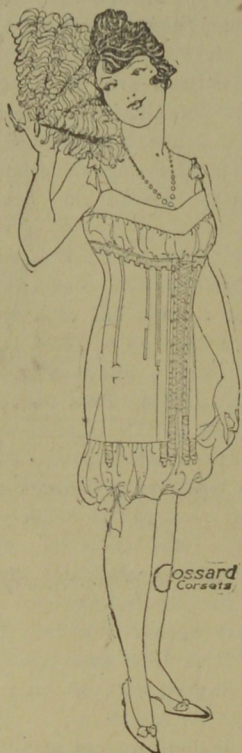

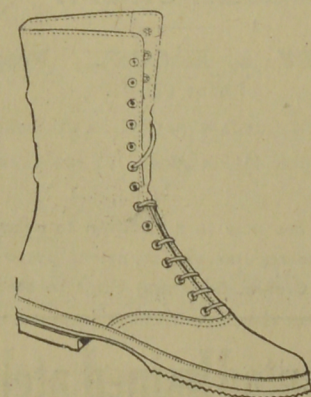
