### No Food Wastage

Mrs. Mittell looks after her wards and among other things sees to it that the food regulations are strictly complied with. She does not tolerate any wastage of food. The boys are all blessed with keen appetites, and have no difficulty in getting them appeased. Good substantial food is served to them at regular hours and they seem to thrive upon it. The boy who does not get around for his meals when the horn blows has to fast until the next meal, but it is seldom found necessary to enforce this rule.

### The Only Place

Many of the boys now sojourning at Davidson Lake have tried other camps but they think there is no place like Camp Mittell. They are always sorry when the time comes to leave, and once home again they begin to count the days until the next vacation period. One of the boys now at Davidson Lake has been coming here continuously for nine years. Most of the boys keep on coming until they pass the age limit, and even then it is hard to get rid of them.

Prof. and Mrs. Mittell are again accompanied to the lake this season by their daughter, Miss Sybella Mittell. The young lady has missed but one season at Davidson Lake in fifteen years. She has taken an art course abroad and is very expert as an animal painter. During the present season she has designed and completed a number of artistic posters for horse and dog shows to be held in New York this autumn.

### A Healthy Camp

The boys at the camp enjoy excellent health and gain from ten to fifteen pounds in weight during a season. There has never been a serious accident at the camp and only one occasion has a doctor been called and that was for a supposed case of measles. Prof. Mittell acts as physician and surgeon to the camp and when a boy cuts himself or brushes the skin from his lower limbs when trying to steal a base in a ball game he promptly renders the necessary surgical treatment.

### Tennis in the Woods

The equipment of the camp includes a splendid tennis court, which was completed several years ago. The woods had first to be cleared away and the court was built up with clay and sand which had to be conveyed some distance. It is a splendid court and provides a lot of amusement for the campers.

### A Good Institution

It costs a lot of money to maintain the Davidson Lake Summer colony and the bulk of it goes to the farmers

of Dumfries and the merchants of Fredericton, while the Valley Railway also gets its share. Most of the supplies are bought in Fredericton the grocery bill alone amounting to about \$400 in a season. The boys get monthly checks from home, and upon their arrival they usually find it necessary to make a trip to Fredericton, and while here they find no difficulty in getting separated from their cash. The camp is undoubtedly a splendid institution and there is no reason why there should not be more of them established in the province, for the benefit of American youths as well as our own boys. The youths who spend their summer holidays at such a spot as Davidson's Lake, and live the joyous out-door life are not the kind who turn in much revenue for the doctors for it not be forgotten: that—
