CAMOUFLAGE SOUP.

One tablespoonful of pearl barley, then add to two cups of broth (chicken, veal or mutton). Chop two medium sized white onions and put in a cup of hot water or broth to cook until tender. Onions should always be cooked in salted water. Then combine the barley and onions and add half a cup of nice bread crumbs and simmer for half an hour. Cream a spoon of butter and flour and stir in the barley to keep it from settling. Add a cup of milk or a little thin cream at serving time. Allow to boil up and serve. Add a dusting of paprika and dash more salt if needed to give nice seasoning. Very tasty with crisp croutons.

COLD BLUEBERRY CHARLOTTE.

Cold blueberry charlotte is an extremely simple dessert, as it requires no cooking save the stewing of the fruit. Cut one small stale loaf of bread (that made from barley and rice flour is recommended) in thin slices and spread with butter. Stew one quart of blueberries and add a little currant or lemon juice to give a piquant tartness. When soft, sweeten to taste. In a deep dish put a layer of the bread, pour over a quantity of the boiling mixture and add more bread and fruit until the ingredients are used up. Serve very cold with thin cream or rich milk to which a little grated nutmeg has been added.

CHOCOLATE POTATO CAKE.

One-half cup fat, one cup sugar, two eggs, slightly beaten, three-fourths of a cup of mashed potato, one-fourth of a teaspoon salt, one cup flour, one teaspoon baking powder, three-eighths of a cup of milk, one-half cup of grated chocolate, melted over hot water.

Cream fat and sugar; add eggs and potato; add the flour, mixed with the baking powder and salt, alternately with the milk. Add the chocolate last. Bake in layers or muffin tins.

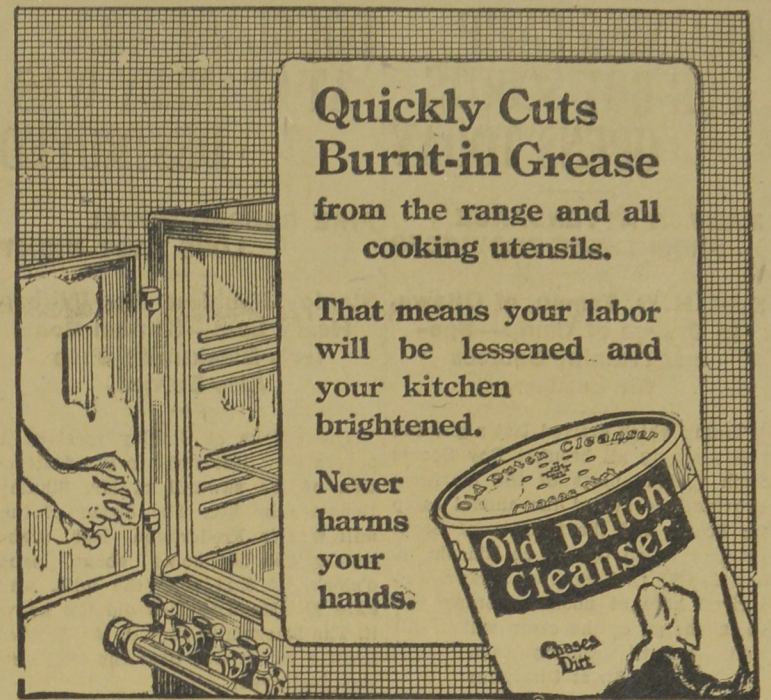
