

ARRANGEMENTS COMPLETED IN SOUTH PARISHES

SHERIFF HAWTHORNE APPOINTS PLACES

Registration on Saturday, June 22nd—School Houses to be Used Generally in Rural Districts.

Sheriff J. B. Hawthorne has completed arrangements for the general registration of all residents on Saturday June 22, in the combined counties of York and Sunbury, as far as the Southern parishes are concerned. He has yet to make his arrangements in the districts along the St. John River and in the northern parishes. As a general thing schoolhouses are to be used throughout the rural districts as places of registration. He will visit Napudogan and other places in the north in the near future.

In the southern part of Sunbury County places of registration have been selected as follows: Fredericton Junction, public hall; Tracey, school house; Hoyt, schoolhouse; Central Blissville, Smith Brothers store; they are in York County as follows: Harvey Station, schoolhouse; Brockway, schoolhouse; Tweedside schoolhouse; Jewett's Mill, schoolhouse; McAdam, schoolhouse and Immigration Room in C. P. R. station; Canterbury Station, schoolhouse; Forest City, schoolhouse; Foster's Corner, schoolhouse; Maxwell, schoolhouse.

CHAS. H. THOMAS DIED SUDDENLY LAST NIGHT

EX-MAYOR AND ALDERMAN FOR ST. ANN'S FOR YEARS

Prominent in Public Life of City and Successful Business Man—Formerly of St. John.

Charles H. Thomas, ex-mayor of Fredericton died suddenly at his residence, Waterloo Row, last night at the age of seventy-two years. The deceased had been under the doctor's care since February last but was out yesterday and stated that he felt better than he had in some time. Death was caused by failure of the heart.

Native of Nova Scotia

Ex-mayor Thomas was a native of Nova Scotia having been born at Horton but was brought up in St. John where his father the late Charles H. Thomas was in business. In early life he came to Fredericton and established a shirt and tie factory the latter being located in the Inches Building, Queen Street. Later he removed to the building now occupied by R. G. Lee and continued the factory and opened a retail gentlemen's furnishings store. Still later he established Oak Hall at the site where it now is and conducted at all times a successful business from active participation in which he retired several years ago.

In Public Life

At all times he took a prominent part in the public life of the community. He represented St. Ann's Ward for a number of years as alderman, and in 1910 and 1911 was mayor being returned without opposition. He was a lifelong member of the Liberal-Conservative party and was president of its organization in York County for a number of years. Several years ago he was given the opportunity of being postmaster of Fredericton but declined the honor.

He was prominently identified with the Knights of Pythias in this city being a charter member of the first lodge established and in his younger days was prominent in the Uniform Rank. He also was a Forester for the greater part of his life. He was a prominent member of the Methodist denomination in this city.

Surviving Relatives

The deceased is survived by a widow, two sons and one daughter. The sons are James H. Thomas, a civil engineer in Florida and Frank T. Thomas who conducts the business in this city. The daughter is Mrs. R. A. W. Leard of Searlestown, P. E. I. A sister Miss Ida Thomas of this city also survives. Interment will be made at the Rural Cemetery.

HEAVY RAIN AIDS FIGHTING FOREST FIRE

NO WORD FROM FIRE RAGING ON THE SEVOGLE

Chief Forester G. H. Prince in Charge of Crew—Farmers Hail Rain with Great Pleasure.

The heavy rain which set in last night and continued until this afternoon is hailed with joy by the farmers as it follows a most successful seeding season and will do much good to the crops and by the lumbermen as it will help to extinguish forest fires and make the woods wet and less liable to burn.

Fire on SevoGLE

The Provincial Department of Lands and Mines received today no word from Chief Forester G. H. Prince, who is in charge of a large crew of fire-fighters on the SevoGLE in the Northwest Miramichi country. No news is taken as good news and it is believed that the fire-fighters assisted by weather conditions are making headway against the flames. This is the first serious fire reported to the Department. It was reported Saturday night and immediate steps were taken to check it. It is on the Sinclair limits. Twenty men were taken from Newcastle and others were secured at points nearer the fire, which is in a place difficult of access the men having to drive twenty-five miles by country roads and an equal distance over tote roads.

Will Help Greatly

The rain of yesterday and today has not been heavy enough to drown out a fire of the size of that on the SevoGLE but it will have a beneficial effect on fires in other sections.

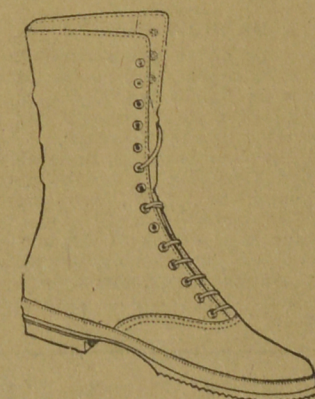
