## COUNTY LICENSE FEE OF TEN DOLLARS FOR JUNK DEALERS

### Motion Passed in Spite of Opposition--- Councillors Raise Their Own Salaries to Legal Limit of Five Dollars per Day--- Over expenditure on Smallpox Outbreak of \$1,500.

The York County Council Wednesday afternoon imposed a license fee of ten dollars upon every buyer of junk in the County of York. This action was taken on the motion of Coun. Seymour it being thought that the time was ripe for the imposition of a tax upon this class. There was some opposition. The report of the Secretary of the Board of Health Mrs. Clarence Goodspeed was received. Expenditures to the amount of \$1,500 are outstanding on account of smallpox. There was some discussion concerning the distribution of seed grain which was adjourned until a report was received from the Seed Grain Committee. The matter of increasing the councillors pay again was considered and on a vote it was decided to increase the pay to the legal maximum of five dollars per day.

#### Board of Health

When the council resumed at 2.30 p. m. Wednesday, Mr. Clarence Goodspeed Secretary of the York County Board of Health reported. He stated that in January he had reported the county clear of contagious disease but since that time there had been outbreaks of smallpox. These outbreaks had entailed considerable expense. An outbreak at Napadogan had been particularly expensive on account of difficulty in reaching the place. The appropriation of \$1,500 made in January had been expended and additional expenditure had been incurred to the amount of \$1,200. Another appropriation could not legally be asked for at the present session. Nevertheless he hoped that the council would put the Board in a position to settle outstanding accounts. The government had been asked to pay part of this smallpox expenditure and the matter was under consideration. The account for the Indian smallpox outbreak had been forwarded to the Dominion Government. If the latter did not act the province probably would help. It would require \$1,500 to clean up old outstanding accounts. The expenditure had not been excessive when the seriousness of the outbreak was taken into consideration. Coun. Wetmore was given leave of absence at his own request.

The Committee on the Secretary-Treasurer's Accounts reported to the effect that the report of the auditor was confirmed.

#### Seed Grain.

Coun. Fox suggested extra remuneration for the Secretary-Treasurer for her labor in connection with the distribution of seed grain.

Coun. Dougan supported the suggestion. Mrs. Glenn deserved extra remuneration as she had done much extra work. The Councillors of course expected to receive no recompense. They had the honor.

Coun. Hugh Smith said the people believed that they had paid for all that had been done in the five per cent for distribution. It had been dear seed.

Coun. Dougan said that in Manners-Sutton the agricultural society had imported grain for \$1.45 and the government grain had been brought in for \$1.43.

Coun. Hugh Smith—"Was there corn in it?"

Coun. Dougan—"No there is not. It is fine grain."

Coun. Fox moved that fifty dollars be paid the Secretary-Treasurer for her services in the seed grain distribution.

Coun. Pat Graham objected that the Secretary-Treasurer was on salary and should not receive extras.

Coun. Allen pointed out that the duties in connection with the seed grain purchase were not part of the secretary treasurer's office.

Interment will be at the Sheffield Cemetery.

## MR. KIDNER MAKES PLEA FOR SOLDIERS

Pittsburgh, Pa., July 3.—A plea for state aid in vocational re-education of disabled soldiers was made here today, by T. B. Kidner, of Ottawa, secretary of Invalid Soldiers Commission of Canada, in an address before the special education section of the national education association, which opened its three day session with departmental sessions.

"Decorations and war medals," said Mr. Kidner, "are not sufficient to pay the nation's debt, to those who have become disabled by wounds or disease in the fight against tyranny on the battlefields of Europe or the seven seas. The state should not only protect its wounded by giving them the means wherewith to earn their livelihood, but it should also strive to so manage its work that the mutilated may come out of the disaster improved morally, socially and economically."
