A new screen has been ordered for the city stone crusher. This will screen four different sizes of stone. It will be equipped with a dust-jacket which will prevent dust from rising. The crusher never before had a dust-jacket. The cost will be upwards of \$300.

Violation is Charged

In the police court this morning a charge of violation of the Intoxicating Liquor Act 1916 was preferred against the owner of a local restaurant. The case resulted from the seizure of a bottle of liquor among a party at this restaurant some weeks ago. Several witnesses were examined.

Reported Saved

According to a despatch from Halifax Frank Williams of Fredericton and Harry Harrison of Marysville were aboard the Llandoverly Castle, the hospital steamer recently torpedoed between England and Canada but have been saved. The news was received with joy by their relatives.

Minister of Public Works

Hon. P. J. Veniot, Minister of Public Works, arrived last night from the North Shore. This morning he left for Victoria County where in company with Premier Foster he will inspect highways. The minister devoted himself to office work until an early hour this morning.

Sold Pipe to Devon

A quantity of three-inch iron pipe which had been lying at the pumping station for some time has been sold by the City Water Department to the Town of Devon at twenty-five dollars per ton, the total price being about sixty dollars. The pipe was useless to the city but can be used in Devon.

To Build Bathing Houses

Joseph Owens has been given the contract for building two bathing houses at the West End Beach. The price for the two buildings, which will be in section and removable is \$185. The special committee of the City Council in charge of the matter has been continued.

The Currie Charges

The enquiry into the charges preferred by Hon. J. B. M. Baxter against Hon. William Currie, speaker of the Legislature, will be commenced before Commissioner Friel at Campbellton on Tuesday next. Mr. Baxter will appear in support of the charges and Mr. A. T. LeBlanc, M. P. P. will appear as counsel for Speaker Currie.

Painful Accident

Coun. Robert Thompson the vector of the York Municipal Council met with a serious and painful accident at his home at Harvey on Saturday last. He was driving a load of lumber and in trying to stop the horses which had taken fright he slipped and fell between the wheels of the heavy wagon. One of the wheels passed over his legs and bruised them very seriously but fortunately no bones were broken. The veteran councillor though somewhat lame is able to be present at the meeting of the council this week.

SEED GRAIN MATTERS OCCUPIED ATTENTION OF COUNTY COUNCIL DURING SESSION THIS MORNING

Surplus of One Hundred Dollars Left in Hands of Committee to be Disposed of at Will—Some Councillors Believe They Should be Paid for Services in Connection with Distribution of Seed Grain—Full Report Presented—Bonuses for Flour Mills are Needed—Miscellaneous Business.

The Municipal Council of York County Thursday morning devoted much attention to the matter of Seed Grain distribution. The committee which had charge of the distribution presented a full report and also a financial statement which showed a surplus of \$3101. That surplus caused much trouble. Some councillors wanted it divided among the councillors for their services in connection with the distribution, others wanted it given the Secretary Treasurer, still others wanted it placed in the county funds and others wanted it left in the hands of the committee to dispose of it as they deemed fit. After voting down all three motions made the council reconsidered and left the money in the hands of the committee.

In connection with the same matter the council took steps to bring to the attention of the Provincial Government the necessity for bonusing flour mills in this section of the province to take care of the increased crop of wheat.

Thursday Morning

Thursday the Council resumed at 10 a. m.

Leave of absence for the session was given Coun. D. Clarkson.

Ex-Warden S. B. Hunter, M. P. P., who was present was invited to a seat beside the warden.

Coun. Pond referred to a statement made at the January session to the effect that moneys due the county were in the hands of Mr. Sansom of Stanley. He wished in fairness to that gentleman to state that the moneys had been paid by Mr. Sansom in 1915 to the late Secretary Treasurer but never credited.

M. A. McLeod

M. A. McLeod, representing the Provincial Department of Agriculture was heard on Seed Grain Distribution. He congratulated the farmers of the province upon the hearty response they had made to the invitation of the Department to assist in planting greater acreage of grain.

The Department had imported 284-274 bushels of oats, one tenth of which had been distributed in York, 18,184 bushels of wheat of which York took 963 bushels and 1,368 bushels of barley of which 77½ were taken by York. The work of the municipal councillors had been of great assistance. He referred particularly to Coun. Everett and Coun. T. W. Brewer who had been ably supported by

the Secretary Treasurer Mrs. Glenn. Mr. McLeod referred to the Clover Huller which was available for any farmer with ten acres or more. He also referred to the lime-rock crusher.

Seed-Grain Report

Coun. Everett presented the report of the Committee on the Distribution of Seed Grain which is as follows: To The County Council of The Municipality of York:—

Gentlemen: Your Seed Grain Committee appointed at the January Session of Council, beg leave to report as follows: That at a meeting of this Committee on February 1st, it was decided to advertise in the local newspapers asking that all orders for Seed Grain be filed with the Councillors of their respective Parishes, these orders in turn to be filed with the Secretary Treasurer by February 16th, so as to give your Committee an idea of the quantities required.

Your Committee then met and ordered through the Agricultural Department 826 bushels of Wheat, 2 cars of oats (1,800 bushels each) to be delivered at Otis Station. At the same your Committee deemed it prudent to add five cents per bushel to cover distribution expenses. Later, your Committee gave a further order to the Department for 2,975 bushels of oats, 137 bushels of wheat, and 75½ bushels of Barley, making a total of 8,215 bushels of oats, 963 bushels of wheat and 75½ bushels of barley, at a total cost of \$14,403.62, exclusive of freight bank and other charges.

The Report of the Secretary-Treasurer will give detail of the receipts and expenditures to date.

There are still some small matters to be adjusted as between the Department of Agriculture, and several Parishes, with your Committee, rendering it necessary to make a further Report at the next session of the Council. The Committee secured the services of Mr. F. H. Everett for storing and shipping the Grain from Fredericton, the Department of Agriculture paying his expenses.
