SIXTEEN LIVES
WERE LOST ON
THE CAROLINA

Lewis, Del. June 4—Survivors of the Carolina reaching here today after a tremendous struggle all night with thunderstorm. Sixteen people lost their lives through the capsizing of the boat. In the morning an object was seen in the water. There was no way to reach it as the launch had lost her gasoline and oars. The launch, however, drifted close and the survivors were startled to discover a girl alive clinging to the bodies of two drowned men. The bodies were incased in life belts but the girl wore none. She appeared to be a good swimmer and with her own efforts and clinging to two bodies for support she managed to remain afloat. The launch got near enough to her to effect her rescue and she proved to be Eleona Donato Virola, of Porto Rico. She is one of the two women landed.

She was one of those in the launch and became separated from it when it capsized.

Two woman graduates of a special course in bacteriology at Hunter College are now in the army camps with the rank of second lieutenant, and later will be sent to the front.

SOME RECENT ORDERS BY
THE CANADA FOOD BOARD

The following orders issued by the Canada Food Board are published for the information of our readers:

CANADA FOOD BOARD

Order No. 33, Re Manufacture of Ice Cream, Confectionery, etc.

In exercise of the powers conferred upon it by Order of His Excellency the Governor General in Council, dated the 15th day of November, 1917, P. C. 3214, and of all other powers enabling it in that behalf, the Canada Food Board hereby orders as follows:—

1. On and after the first day of June, 1918, no person shall manufacture in Canada for sale, ice cream, candy, cake, crackers, biscuits, pastry, confectionery, ice cream cones or chewing gum without first having obtained from the Canada Food Board a license, to be called "Confectioners' License," provided, however, that persons holding a Bakers' license under Order No. 16 of this Board, or a Public Eating House License under Order No. 25 of this Board, shall not require a Confectioners' License under this Order.

CANADA FOOD BOARD

Order No. 35, Re Making Candy, Frosting, etc., for private consumption.

In exercise of the powers conferred upon it by Order of His Excellency, the Governor General in Council, dated the 12th day of March, 1918, P. C. 596, and of all other powers enabling it in that behalf, the Canada Food Board hereby orders as follows:

1. No person shall make in Canada for private consumption, French pastries, iced cakes, or biscuits or cakes with icing of cane sugar between the layers, or added to the exterior; and no person shall use in Canada cane sugar for making, for private consumption, what is commonly called candy.

2. Any person violating any of the provisions of this Order shall be liable to the penalties enacted in the Order of His Excellency, the Governor General in Council, dated the twelfth day of March, 1918, P. C. 596, in which penalties are provided by the following clauses: Same as provided in Order No. 30. Dated at Ottawa, this twenty-seventh day of April, 1918.

RE TAX ON MATCHES

The excise tax on matches does not become effective until July 1st, 1918, and goods disposed of before that date may be sold at present prices.

The Commissioner of Taxation says that clause 4 of section 16 A. states specifically that "Every wholesale and retail dealer shall affix on each unstamped package of matches an adhesive or other stamp of the value of one cent for each 100 matches or fraction of 100 matches contained in such package held by him for sale on the 1st day of July, 1918."

We understand that manufacturers are affixing the necessary stamps on all goods sold since the order was passed.

RE TAX ON TEA

There has been a good deal of uncertainty as to the meaning of the excise tax on tea. According to the wording of the new budget it appeared that on any stocks over and above 1,000 pounds that it would be necessary to pay 10 cents a pound on the total stocks. It has been decided, however, that the retail grocer will have a 1000 pound exemption. That is if the grocer has 1200 pounds of tea in stock, he will have to pay the excise tax of 10 cents a pound on 200 pounds only.

SOME QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS.

The following questions were answered by H. B. Thomson chairman of the Canada Food Board at a meeting of the Retail Merchants Association held in Toronto recently.

Canada Grocer, May 17.

Question.—Can a grocer sell such icing sugar as he has on hand, supposing he has about 100 pounds?

Mr. Thomson.—There is no restriction against his selling it.

Question.—Is it legal to compel a customer to buy other goods in order to secure sugar.

Mr. Thomson.—As long as they are not increasing sales this is legal.

Question.—How about customers who want sugar for preserving?

Mr. Thomson.—When the time comes that question will be answered.

ried forward how does it affect the question?

Answer.—In that case license number will be required.

Question.—How about the sanitary conditions of homes returning food?

Dr. Hastings, Toronto Medical Health Officer, replied: We could not permit the return of food from any house where there had been a communicable disease.

Question.—Does a grocer's license permit the sale of ice cream cones?

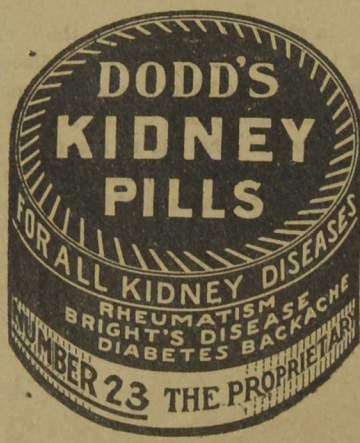
Answer.—Yes.

Question.—Will restaurateurs be permitted to serve meat either at noon or evening meal if their preference is stated on their license?
