

## DISORDERLY HOUSE RAIDED BY THE POLICE

**SAID TO BE CONDUCTED  
IN CAMP ON CROSSROAD**

**Woman Belonging to This City  
and Invalided Soldier Ar-  
rested—Both Deny  
Charges.**

The police last night raided a camp on the crossroad between the Poor House and the Brick Kiln road, and arrested a woman well known about the city and a soldier who is an inmate of the Convalescent Home.

The woman is Mrs. Minnie McClellan.

Both appeared in the police court this morning, the woman on a charge of keeping a disorderly house, and the soldier on a charge of being on inmate of the same. Each pleaded not guilty and was remanded until the 30th.

Frequent complaints concerning the camp had been made recently and it had been under observation by the police for some days.

Residents of York street say that the camp appeared to be a very popular resort and that those staying there had numerous callers.

It is understood that on some occasions the entertainments there were rather noisy. The mental condition of the woman in question is not considered sound and it is probable that the authorities will take steps to have her taken care of.

### Mid-Week Market

There was a very fair market this morning and much country produce changed hands at good prices. Eggs sold at 60 cents, butter at 40, potatoes at \$4 per barrel, turnips at \$1.50, blueberries at 20 cents a box, corn at 25 cents a dozen, cucumbers at 30 cents a dozen, apples at 50 cents a peck, veal at 13 and 20 cents, fowl at 12 cents, chicken at \$2.50, lamb at \$1.50 to \$2.50.

### May Call Class C.

There is a rumor current in military circles that at least some of Class "C" men under the Military Service Act are to be soon called to the colors. Nothing definite is available on the matter but the rumor comes from a military source. In connection with the report it is pointed out that various garrison regiments stationed at different points in the country are lacking available men—that is class "C" men.

### Jewish Leave Days

Official word has been received at district headquarters that leave of absence will be granted to all Jewish soldiers in the C. E. F. from sunset on Friday, September 6, until sunset on Sunday, September 8, to allow the Jewish soldiers to celebrate their New Year. Leave of absence will also be granted for their "Atonement day", beginning on September 15 and ending on the following day.

### Changes in U. N. B. Faculty

There will be two changes in the faculty of the University of New Brunswick for the coming year. Dr. W. C. Kierstead will return to the position he previously held on the faculty. Prof. J. T. Hebert who has been filling Dr. Kierstead's position will return to Harvard to finish his course in law there. The second change in the faculty has been made through the appointment of Prof. W. E. Blampin, an honor graduate in English from McGill.

## WILL APPROACH THE DOMINION GOVERNMENT

**MARITIME CONFERENCE  
AT HALIFAX YESTERDAY**

**Land Settlement for Returned  
Soldiers Discussed—Hon.  
J. F. Tweeddale Has  
Returned.**

Hon. J. F. Tweeddale, Minister of Agriculture, returned this morning from the Interprovincial Conference of Premiers and members of executives of the three Maritime Provinces, held at Halifax yesterday.

Among numerous matters discussed was the Land Settlement for Returned Soldiers. This matter will be taken up further with the Dominion government. It will be suggested that advisory boards be established in each province to look after returned men. Other business of importance was dealt with satisfactorily.

Those present were Premier Hon. W. E. Foster and Hon. J. F. Tweeddale of New Brunswick; Premier Hon. A. E. Arsenault and Hon. Messrs. McKinnon and McEwen, of P. E. Island, and Premier Hon. G. H. Murray and Hon. R. M. McGregor, of Nova Scotia.

Flour Mill at Grand Falls.

The Department of Agriculture has arranged for the establishment at Grand Falls of a flour mill with a daily capacity of 50 bbls. The location is regarded as eminently suitable on account of railway facilities. Hon. Mr. Tweeddale will urge upon the government the advisability of increasing the grant to large flour mills.

### "Cabby" Got Stung

A St. John's city cabman sued a citizen for 75c. fare for driving defendant's wife and child and sister and carrying a trunk from the head of Casey street to the "Sagana" at Reid's dock. Prior to the drive the cabby agreed to a 50c. fare, but says he did not agree to carry three passengers and a trunk. Judge Morris held that as 50 cents was the contract price the time for the cabman to raise the fare was before he took the freight on board. Judgement for 50 cents.

### Dropped Dead at Douglas Boom.

Mr. Isalah Whitehead of Springfield dropped dead at the Douglas boom this morning after complaining of feeling unwell. He was aged seventy-three years. Yesterday he said he was not well and this morning he stopped work at the boom, saying he doubted if he ever could work again. Soon afterward he dropped dead. Dr. B. M. Mullin, coroner, viewed the body and decided an inquest was not necessary, death being due to natural causes. His two sons were summoned by telephone and arrived this afternoon.

## PHOTOGRAPHERS EXPLAIN THEIR POSITION

**ONE AN OFFICER OF  
THE CANADIAN FORCES**

**Not German Spies—Place the  
Onus for Press Notices  
in Moncton on Chief  
Rideout.**

The photographers who are representing a firm in Guelph, Ont., and who began business in this city yesterday informed the Mail this morning that they were in no position of being suspected of being German spies although in several places in New Brunswick trouble had been made for them. Mr. A. Leo Fisher, one of them, belongs to Cornwall, N. S., and is a reserve officer of the Canadian forces having ranked as captain in No. 1 Siege Company. He was declared medically unfit. He carries his identification card from the intelligence office at Halifax. Mr. C. L. Weller, the other, is a native of the United States and has registered under the draft regulations of that country. He has been in Canada for some years. They are representing a photographic firm in Guelph.

Place Onus on Rideout.

Messrs. Eisner and Weller place the onus for some disagreeable press notices which they received in Moncton, upon Chief of Police Rideout, formerly of this city, who they say gave a story to the papers not in accordance with facts, because he was angry on account of the photographers having employed one of the members of the police force who had left without giving notice.

They encountered some trouble of a like nature also at Campbellton.

Both gentlemen deny that they ever have taken photographs of harbors. Mr. Weller was in Fredericton about two years ago following the same line of business as at the present time.

This morning they consulted a local firm of barristers with a view toward taking legal action against a newspaper in another part of the province which published a story concerning them.

### Sentence Suspended

The case of the youth, charged with stealing a sum of money from the safe in Mr. R. T. Mack's drug store was heard yesterday afternoon. The boy was found guilty and given a five year's suspended sentence in the reformatory by Police Magistrate Limerick.
