## TO GUARANTEE PRICE OF HOGS

Washington, Sept. 25—Guarantee to farmers of a minimum price of \$15.50 a hundred pounds for hogs during the war is recommended by the national agricultural advisory committee in a report submitted today to the food administration. Though the food administration possesses no power to fix definite prices for hogs or for corn, the report points out that prices may be related to a great extent through controlled orders for the army, navy and export trade.

## HOW TO AVOID ACCIDENTS FROM USE OF ELECTRICITY

Electricity, like fire, is a valuable servant, but a dangerous master. So long as it is kept in perfect control it is the most convenient and cleanly source of energy that science has made available for use in the household. But it must be controlled. Hundreds of lives are lost every year and much property destroyed as a result of defective wiring and the careless handling of this remarkable unseen force.

Below is a brief summary of recommendations by the United States Bureau of Standards which, if followed, will go far toward eliminating accidents in the use of electricity:

(1) Never touch a wire or any electrical device which has fallen on a street, alley or lawn, or which hangs within reach, if there is any possibility that it may be touching any overhead electric wire. This applies to insulated overhead wires as well as to bare ones.

(2) Avoid touching any wires which are used to anchor poles to the ground or the ground wire run down wood poles. Never try to jar arc lamps, nor touch the chains or ropes supporting them. During and after storms do not touch even the poles, if wet.

(3) Never climb a pole or tree or on near which electric wires pass. Never touch such wires from windows nor while on roofs. Warn children against climbing poles or standing on pole steps.

(4) Never throw string, sticks, or pieces of wire over the electric wires carried overhead. Also, never fly kites

near overhead wires, nor throw sticks or stones at insulators.

(5) Do not touch or disturb any electric wiring or appliances in buildings except such as are intended to be handled. Keep furniture and other materials away from interior wires or otherwise adequately protected against mechanical injury. After using portable heating appliances, irons, etc. turn off current before leaving them.

(6) Never touch those interior live metal parts of sockets, plugs, etc., which are used to carry current. Use the insulating handles which are provided for that purpose. While in bathrooms, toilet rooms, kitchens, laundries, basements or other rooms with damp floors, stoves, heaters, or pipes, etc. which may be touched; avoid touching any metal part of lamp sockets, fixtures or other electrical devices since they may accidentally be alive. While in a bathtub never touch any part of an electric cord or fixture even if it is a non-conductor. The use of electric vibrators in the bath is dangerous. Avoid touching stoves or other metal when using telephone, particularly during electrical storms.

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## VON HERTLING STATES AIMS OF GERMANY

Amsterdam, Sept. 25—Count von Hertling, the German imperial chancellor, in addressing the Reichstag main committee complained of the lack of attention his acquiescence in the four points laid down by president Wilson as peace essentials had met from the American executive.

The chancellor asserted that on February 22 of this year he declared in the Reichstag his agreement in principle with the possibility of discussing a general peace on the basis of the four points of president Wilson's message of February 2, but that president Wilson neither at that time nor since had he any notice of the chancellor's declaration.

Count von Hertling continued by declaring that he favored the formation of a league of nations, the promotion of universal successive disarmament in equal proportions, the establishment of obligatory courts of arbitration, the freedom of the seas and the protection of small nations.

"We have never concealed the fact said chancellor von Hertling, in the course of his address, 'that all thoughts of conquests were far from our minds. But how do things stand on the opposite side? If one credited the utterances of the enemy, official and unofficial they only desire to repel a Germany which in criminal arrogance is striving for world domination: to fight for freedom and justice against German imperialism and Prussian militarism."

"We know better. The world war was prepared years ago by the well known encircling policy of King Edward. In France there arose extensive war literature, which referred to impending war with Germany. Austria-Hungary's influence in the Balkans was to be eliminated. The Russian expansion movement and the pan Slavic idea demanded it.

"The match was not put to the powder by the Prussian military party, but while the German emperor, up to the last moment, endeavoring to preserve peace, the Russian military party put through the mobilization against the will of the weak czar and thereby made war unavoidable.

"The official account of the Sukhomlinoff trial made this clear to everybody who desired to see. We can look calmly forward to the judgment of posterity. For the present, it is true, those who are in power in the enemy countries have succeeded by an unparalleled campaign.

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shocks from the wiring in buildings or on streets nor induce others to take such risks.

(8) Avoid touching bare or abraded spots on flexible electric cords. Do not hang such cords on nails and when damaged have them repaired or replaced by a competent electrician.

(9) Never touch a person who has been shocked while he is still in contact with the electric circuit, unless you know how to remove him without danger to yourself. Call a doctor and the nearest lighting company. Use a long dry board or wooden handled rake or broom to draw the person away from the wire, or the wire away from him. Never use any metal or any moist object.

(10) To resuscitate a person suffering from electric shock draw his tongue out of his throat and apply artificial respiration for two or three hours, if necessary.

(11) Watch for and report any fallen wires, defective wiring, etc.

(12) Never employ anyone but competent electricians to repair or change wiring and do not attempt it yourself unless qualified to do so.
